MAPLE LEAF TO IDENTIFY NATIONAL RAIL BOX CARS

Montreal, March—A wartime departure in the design of the color scheme of box cars rolling on the Canadian National Railways may now be seen on the first of 1,100 forty-ton all-steel freight cars which are decorated with a Maple Leaf and the slogan "Serves All Canada." The conventional box car red has been retained, railwaymen in general regarding this as the best color for the purpose, but the red color has been extended to trucks, wheels and all underslung equipment previously painted in black. The Maple Leaf in white clearly identifies these new cars which are required to carry munitions and supplies.

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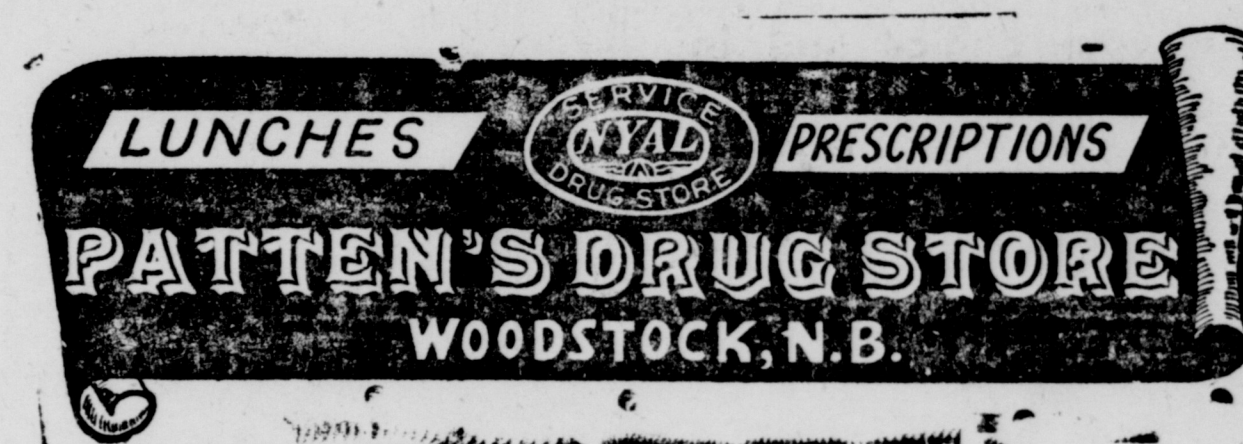
