In November arrangements were made with the Board of the Carleton County Vocational School for the use of a room in their building, free of charge, as an office for the nurse. The baby conferences are now held in the new office which has the advantage of being on the ground floor. Miss Dawson paid a tribute to Miss Carolyn Curry, nurse, who continues to do the nursing service and has the confidence of the doctors, the Board and the general public. Miss Dawson recommended that greater effort be made to reduce the number of night calls for other than confinements. These calls in 1942 were 53 as compared with Newcastle's 26 and Campbellton's 24. needs recruits at once to bring its platoons at Woodstock and Hartland up to war establishment. The need is urgent and eligible men in both communities are urged by the Dept. of National Defence to give serious consideration to enlisting in the Reserve. If ranks are not filled up voluntarily, it is hinted, some drastic measures will be taken to secure recruits.

Single men from 17 to 19 may enlist as can married men not eligible for a call-up for the Active Army. This includes all married men from 30 to 50, and those under 30 who have been granted postponement from active military services. Single men who have been granted postponement for active service or are below the required medical category may also enlist in the Reserve.

Over the week-end a conference of commanding officers of New Brunswick Reserve Units was held at Saint John where this year's training programme was considered. Lt. Col. M. C. Buchanan, officer commanding the 2nd Bn. Carleton and York was in attendance. Announcement is made that a most interesting syllabus of training is scheduled for this year with training to take up 30 nights at local headquarters, ten

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
