PREMIER J. B. MCNAIR ANNOUNCES THIRD SUCCESSIVE SURPLUS FOR PROVINCE

Finances Are Highly Satisfactory

SURPLUS OF THE PROVINCE RUNS OVER THE MILLION DOLLAR MARK

The official audit of the Provincial accounts recently completed by Messrs. P. S. Ross & Sons of Montreal discloses a most satisfactory condition in the year's financial operations.

In ordinary or current account revenue exceeded expenditures by \$1,169,250.93 giving to New Brunswick a record surplus. Contributing factors to this result were buoyancy in revenue and controlled expenditure.

Receipts in all major revenue fields, notwithstanding many restrictive tendencies incidental to war-time regulations, were reasonably maintained, whereas expenditures were kept well within the general estimate.

In specific services only one major over-run in expenditure was evident. This was created in the Department of Lands and Mines and reached the appreciable sum of seventy-six thousand dollars. Comparative figures in this case, however, are misleading in as much as twenty-four thousand dollars of this excess was paid in Forepine Bounties, an outlay authorized by the Legislature after the official estimates had been presented and confirmed. The balance of the over-run was in the Forest Fire Prevention Service, an excess amply justified by circumstances and the necessity of affording protection to our forest wealth.

To regularize the service, the University of New Brunswick's fiscal year was brought in line with that of the Province, causing an excess outlay and thereby reversing a saving in the Department of Education of some nine thousand dollars. A similar situation on a very modified scale was created in the Department of the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, where a moderate saving was reversed through a transfer of a travelling Auditor from the Department of Public Works to the Control and Audit
