COUNTY IS FREE OF DEBT FOR THE FIRST TIME IN MANY YEARS

Improvement Dates From 1933 When New System Was Begun in Co. Office

THE LAST BOND ISSUE WAS IN 1909, AND COUNTY WAS IN DEBT AT THAT TIME; IMPROVEMENT DUE TO BETTER COLLECTIONS

F. O. Creighton, chairman of finance reported that for the first time in 34 years Carleton County was free of debt at the January session of the Carleton County Council which opened in the court house here this week. The last bond issue was in 1909, and it would appear that the county was in debt at that time.

The last of these bonds was paid off in 1931. In 1932 the overdraft and outstanding bills amounted to \$63,000.00 and the council at that time was confronted with the necessity of either floating a bond issue or stimulating tax collections.

In 1933 special tax collectors were appointed and at the same time reorganization was effected in the secretary-treasurer's office. Since that time the improvement in county finances has been steady.

Except for special infantile paralysis appropriation in 1942 the warrant for county and school purposes has not been increased during the past five years. The finance chairman reported the 1942 budget was over expended \$121.50 and the school disbursements were \$278.10 more than was expected.

The increased collections naturally reflect a corresponding decrease in the parish debit balances and delinquent taxes. The parish debit balances aggregate \$22,033.68. Three parishes, Wakefield, Brighton and Peel, have credit balances of \$5737.26. The county delinquent taxes aggregate \$67,513.92, the chairman reported.

Mr. Creighton attributed the improvement to several factors, the discount in settling the provincial hospital account, the tobacco tax, improved collections, wise management on the part of the Secretary Treasurer.

Patients and Receipts Have Grown

NURSE REPORTS, MANY CALLS FOR NURSING AND INSTRUCTION

Miss Carolyn Curry, Victorian Order Nurse traced the progress made by the order in Woodstock since its inception five years ago at the annual meeting of the board held in the town hall Tuesday evening. The number of patients has grown in the five years as have the cash receipts as well.

The year 1942 was a busy one, 265 persons receiving care and to those persons 2,589 home visits were made. Of these 1,985 were for bedside care, the remaining 604 visits were for the purpose of health education, such as prenatal instruction, supervision of health of mother and infants, preschool and school children. Forty-six Child Health Conferences were conducted with a total of 60 infants registered. Eighty-seven night calls were answered.

Twenty-eight visits were made to three schools, where 527 inspections were made.

Miss Grace Caughlin, Chairman paid a tribute to Miss Muriel Munter and Miss Carolyn Curry V. O. N. Nurses who had carried out the work of the order in Woodstock since its inception in 1933. She expressed appreciation of the efforts of H. W. Dick, former treasurer who had removed from Woodstock and congratulated the society on securing the services of Mrs. Gordon Noble for this office.

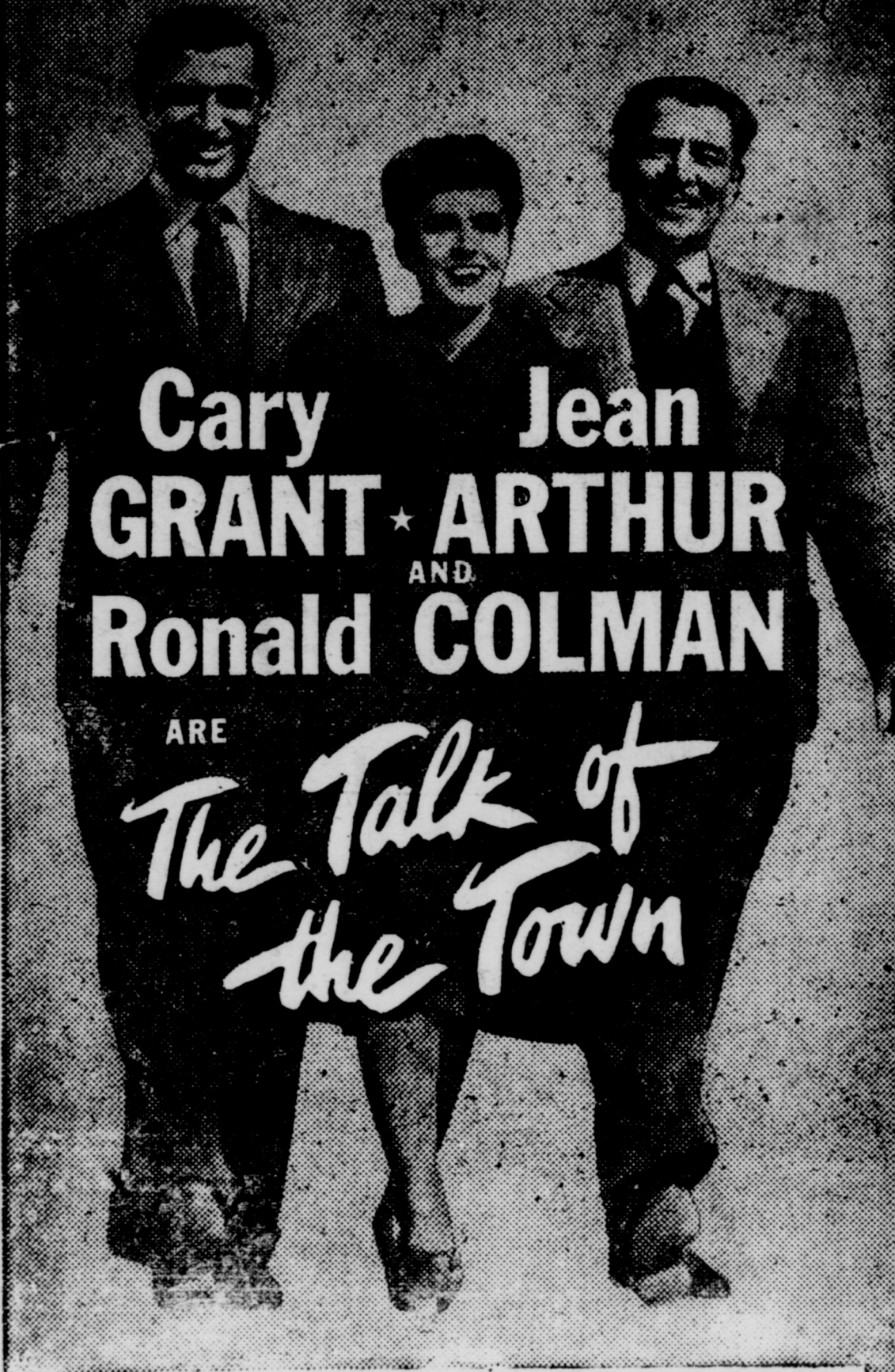
