WOODSTOCK ENDS YEAR WITH \$11,150.27 SURPLUS

Good Credit Balance At Bank

REPORTS ARE HEARD FROM
COUNCILLORS FOR ALL
DEPARTMENTS

That the town of Woodstock finished the year 1942 with a surplus, \$11,150.27 and a credit balance at the bank of \$6,239.71, the first in several years, town manager George B. Kilpatrick stated at the annual town meeting held in the town hall Monday evening. Mr. Kilpatrick said that the total receipts from all sources to be \$116,355.59 with expenditures at \$105,205.32.

The budget of \$110,966.79 was a decrease of \$33.21 under that of 1941. Since income is no longer assessed by municipalities, the town was reimbursed from the Dominion government of \$12,459.29, this figure based on the 1940 assessment. Consequently our tax warrant was reduced to \$74,867.00 in 1942 as compared with \$84,971.19 in 1941, a reduction of \$10,104.19. The tax rate remained at \$3 per hundred for the sixth consecutive year.

Mayer E. Jones thanked those who had taken the trouble to attend the town meeting and regretted that the number was not greater. He said every department had worked to make the surplus. The council had worked to get soldiers stationed in Woodstock and there was still hope that at a later date troops might be here. He stated that he would not offer a gain for mayor.

Coun. Neal, speaking for the finance committee said an honest effort had been made to collect the taxes. New property books had been purchased and filled in for the incoming council. He said he would run for mayor and if elected would discharge
