Twenty-Five Years Ago. From the Carleton Sentinel Files, January 11, 1918.

For a time it was feared that Mrs. George Boyer's residence would be destroyed too. The lower floor of the Taylor block occupied by John Carr and Thomas Thistle were damaged both by fire and water. The loss is estimated at \$18,000.

TESTED RECIPES

and seasoning. Cover and simmer till tender, 2-3 hours. Allow fowl to cool in stock, then remove, skim off excess fat and strain stock. Measure and if there is less than 1 quart, add water to make up this amount. Mix 1-2 cup flour with 1-3 cup milk, blending till smooth. Gradually add 2-3 cup milk and add to stock. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Add fowl, cover an heat. Drop dumpling mixture by spoonful; cover kettle lightly and cook 10-15 minutes without removing lid.

Devilled Backs and Wings
Backs and wings of 2 chickens
1-4 cup fat
1 teaspoon mustard
1-2 teaspoon paprika
1-2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vinegar
2 tablespoon water
1 cup soft, buttered bread crumb
Few grains cayenne pepper
Place pieces of fowl or chicken in baking dish. Mix fat with seasonings and spread over chicken. Add water. Cover with crumbs and bake, covered, in a moderate oven, 350 degrees for 1 hour. Giblets may be cooked in this way but they should be simmered in water till partially tender before baking. Serves 3-4.
