TOWN OF WOODSTOCK BUDGET \$113,377.04 FOR 1943

Tax Warrant Is Set At Aid to Russia Fund Concludes Successfully in this County

\$71,122.46 \$2,080 Higher Than Last Year's Warrant

\$3,436.59 Realized Up to Date

INCREASED WARRANT DUE LARGELY TO BIGGER GRANTS TO SCHOOLS AND LIBRARY; REPAIRS TO WATER MAIN RAISED WATER APPROPRIATION

Woodstock's budget for 1943 was passed at \$113,377.04 at a special meeting of the town council held in the council chamber Wednesday afternoon at 5 o'clock. The budget last year was \$110,966.79. The tax warrant, set at \$71,122.46 was also higher than last year by \$2,080.49.

The increase in the budget is attributed to the increased cost of education, the increased expenditure in the water department due to the burst water main, and a larger grant to the Fisher Memorial Library which grant was raised \$350 from last year.

Present at the meeting were Mayor E. A. Neal, Councilors, Douglas McBride, R. W. Maxwell, V. W. Simms, C. R. DeWitt, and A. L. Kelley, Town Manager George B. Kilpatrick and town clerk C. J. Jones, K. C.

Most of the expenditures were approximately the same as last year with the exception of Education, which was \$25,000.00 as compared with \$23,000.00 in 1942, and water which was \$20,125.06 in 1943 as compared with \$18,874.36 in 1942. The increase in water estimates was caused by the break in the main under the creek bridge and its necessary repair and insulation.

The following grants were made: Vocational School, \$2500; Hospital, \$2000; Library \$2000; V. O. N., \$500; Band, \$300; Salvation Army Boys' Club, \$150; School for the Blind, \$100; Aid to Russia Fund, \$100; C. V. C., \$200; Sundries \$200. Total \$8,050.00.

C. J. Jones, Chairman of the Canadian Aid to Russia Fund in Carleton County expressed satisfaction at the success of the campaign in this district. He announced Tuesday that the sum of \$3,407.99 had been raised to date in this county from voluntary subscriptions. Mr. Jones spoke of the good work of the local chairmen and treasurers in the various localities and especially of the Women's Institutes throughout the county, all of whom had measured up in their usual splendid manner. The result of the campaign which was carried out without a canvass is an indication in itself of the sympathy of the people of our county entertained for the Russian people.

The active campaign closed last Saturday but contributions are still arriving at the office of the treasurer C. M. V. Spence at the Royal. Immediate use is being made of the donations at national headquarters in Toronto to obtain relief supplies so seriously needed by the civilian populations of thousands of miles of ravaged territory which Russian armies are winning back from the Nazis.
