Twenty-Five Years Ago From the
Sentinel Files, Dec. 28th, 1917:

Coun. Wallace Smith, who was knocked down by a runaway horse on Main Street Monday and who was seriously injured, is making a satisfactory recovery. For awhile his condition was critical and caused his friends grave anxiety. Dr. N. P. Grant had a narrow escape in the wild escapade of the runaway as did many others on the crowded street.

The sad news of the death of Pte. Harry W. Havens who was killed in the taking of Passchendaele on November 5, 1917, came as a great shock to his family and friends especially as they were called to mourn about a year ago the death of his only brother Clarence who was killed on the Somme. Pte. Havens leaves his wife, formerly Miss Alice B. Haining and two children Donald R. Havens and Muriel J. Havens; also his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Havens, Jacksonville.

Sometime ago it was reported that Robert Bell had been killed in action. A letter of December 3, received by his wife states that he is not dead but wounded. He is now a patient in a B. E. F. hospital in France.

The town election, January 21st is exciting little interest. Couns. Fleming and Fisher retire, and either Leighton or Smith who received the same vote for the two years term. The first two have stated that they will not offer again. The mayor also retires this year. Among those mentioned as possible candidates are C. J. Jones, C. M. Aughterson, F. O.
