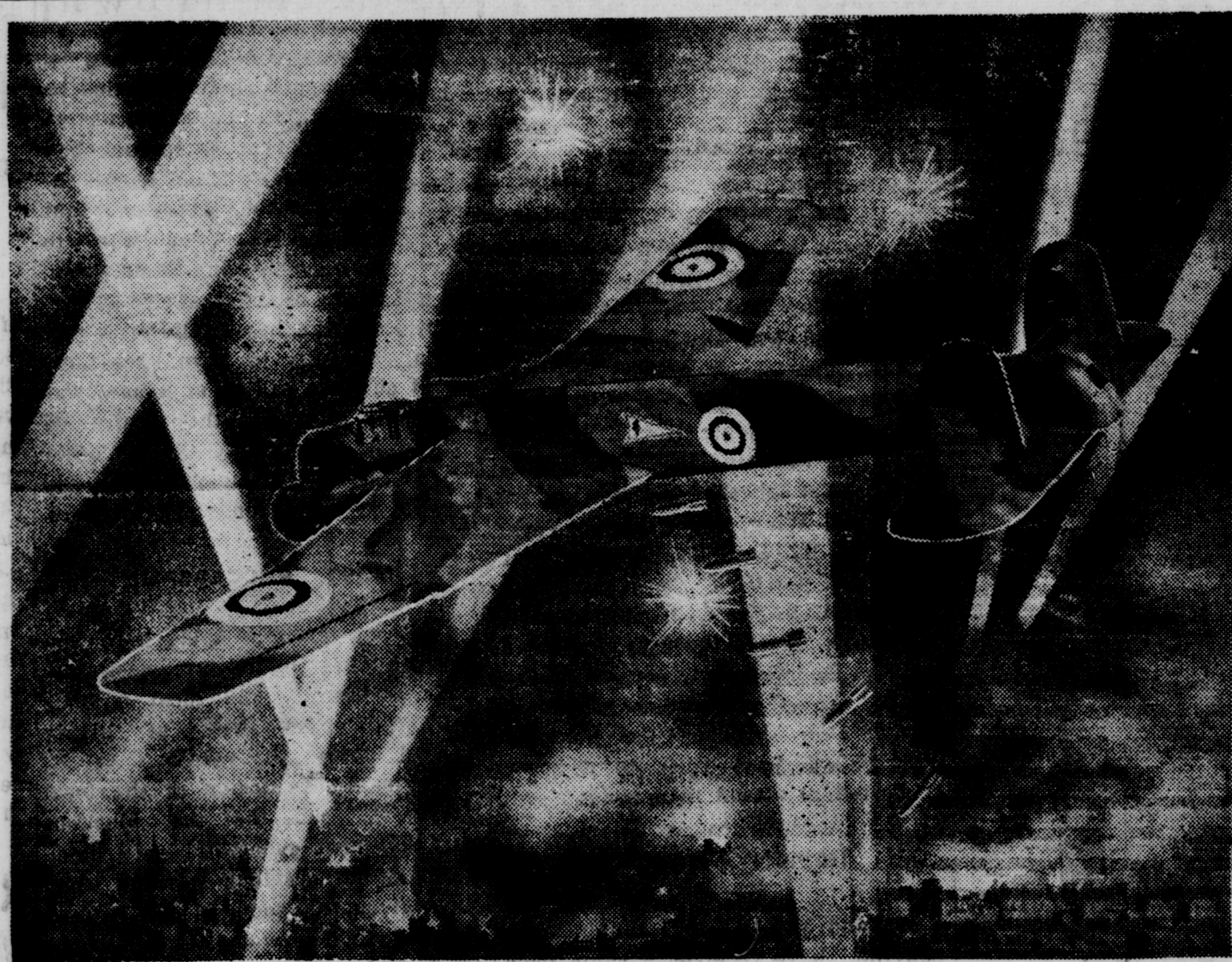

FLYING OVER GERMANY



"Tell them that the pennant has been over Germany several times," writes Pilot Officer James Donald Dickson, R.C.A.F., from overseas "and there are no holes in it yet."

Perhaps this is an omen of success for Canada's Third Victory Loan.

The pennant was given to PO Dickson at the close of the First Victory Loan campaign when, as a flight sergeant, he came back to his home at Hammond River for a last visit before going to Britain to complete his training.

Kings County, where his parents reside, had just come through the campaign with flying colors, exceeding its quota very considerably, and George P. Hamm, who summers on an adjacent farm and who was a member of the campaign organization, presented an extra pennant to young Dickson in honor of the event and also as a talisman.

It was suggested that the airman might tie the pennant to his plane; or perhaps attach it to the fuselage,

anyway, PO Dickson's wife says that, like her photograph, it apparently goes everywhere with him.

Up until the end of August, Dickson had acted as captain of an aircraft 26 times and it is believed that the pennant has been flown on "active service" as many times, flaunting its challenge over Hamburg, Rostock, Essen, Emden and other equally important enemy industrial points.

Although PO Dickson did not say it in so many words, his mother, Mrs. H. Allen Dickson, infers from his letters that her son and the pennant had a bad time in the waters of the English Channel on one occasion.

Another time he may have been saved by the length of a straw. Philip Gurd, of Montreal, was Dickson's roommate. The two boys were in the same flight and took turns as its captain. Whenever an issue had to be decided they drew straws to determine the outcome. Thus, when

they were due for holidays, the straws decided that Dickson would take his first. Philip Gurd, remaining on duty, was killed in action.

PO Dickson enlisted with the R.C. A.F. on Oct. 24, 1940, and went overseas in July, 1941. On Sept. 28, 1942, he was promoted to Pilot Officer.

Dickson is a born pilot, according to his Canadian instructors, and the Air Ministry said of him, in awarding Dickson the D.F.M. recently, "Undeterred by bad weather, he makes every effort to locate the target and bomb it accurately. On one occasion over Stuttgart he descended to 3,000 feet to ensure success."

His wife puts a good proportion of their joint savings into Victory Bonds. They subscribed to each of the first two issues and are investing now in the Third Victory Loan, too.

PO Dickson's two brothers are in the R.C.A.F. also. Cpl. Lawrence Allan Dickson is stationed in Nova Scotia, while AC 1 John Hayes Dickson is in Prince Edward Island.
