MRS. GEORGIA A. GIBERSON

Her many friends in Carleton Place and the passing of Mrs. Georgia A. Giberson, widow of the late Charles A. Giberson of Wicklow, N. B., at her home on Friday, December 11, although in the best of health for a number of years, she was confined to her bed only a few days. Her husband died seven years ago.

Mrs. Giberson was born at Florenceville 50 years ago, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Wheeler and had lived in Carleton County all her life. She was a former school teacher, had married 50 years ago, and has been a resident of Wicklow ever since. For a half a century she has been a member and loyal supporter of the Wicklow United Baptist Church, and was a valued teacher in the Sunday School during her active years. Her home was always an open home for clergymen and Christian workers, and many a needy heart felt the touch of the unfeigned generosity of her and her husband.

Four daughters survive, Mrs. Eugene Nelson (Grace) of Juneau, Alaska, Mrs. Robert Baker (Alice) and Mrs. Carl Anderson (Helen) of Hythe, Alberta, and Miss Frances Giberson at home. Also surviving are one sister, Mrs. Thankful Danks of Port Huron, Michigan, and one half-sister, Mrs. Minnie Parlow of Toronto. Also left to mourn the passing of a kind and generous foster-mother are two boys who made their home with Mrs. Giberson for nearly twenty years, Ernest A. Tompkins of Beechwood and his brother Ray Tompkins of Summerfield.

The funeral was held on Sunday, December 13, from her home, with service at the Wicklow United Baptist Church. The service was conducted by Rev. Raymond Short pastor, assisted by Rev. Edward Milley, East Florenceville, pastor of the Wicklow United Church. Favorite hymns of Mrs. Giberson, were furnished by the Wicklow choir, under the leadership of Mrs. J. E. J. 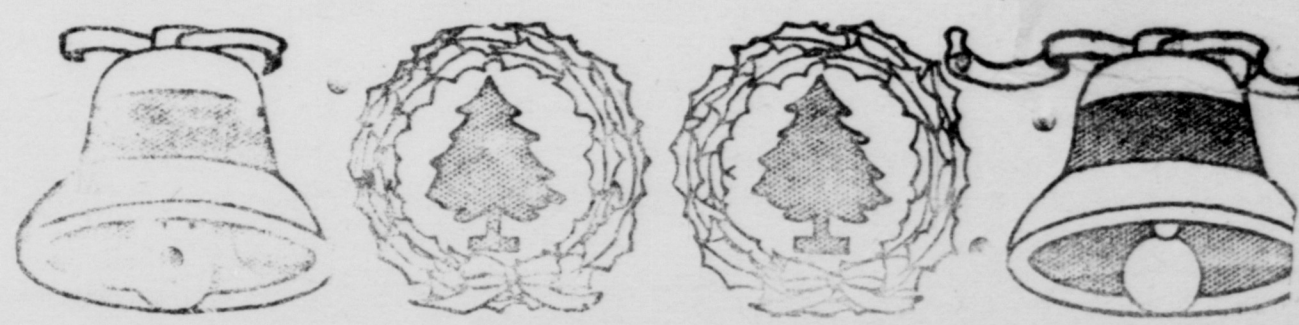

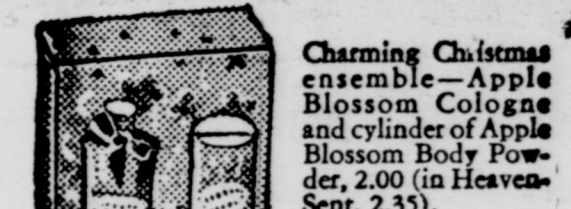

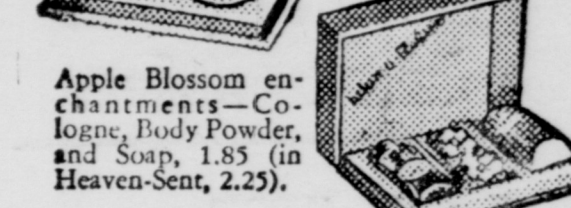
