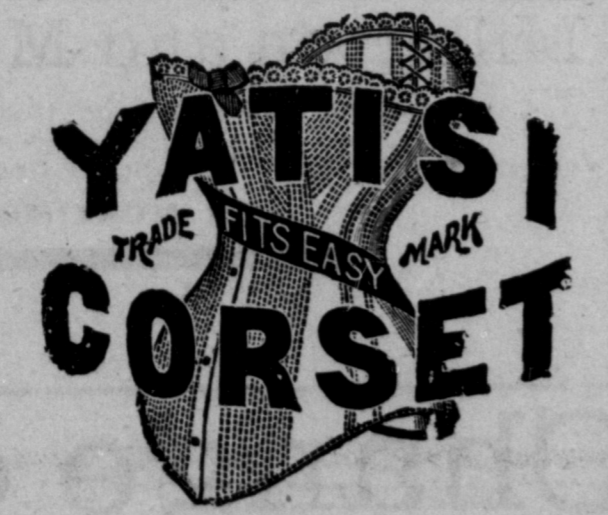

An Audacious Robbery.

NORWICH, Kan., Aug. 31.—This neighborhood is excited over a robbery of grain, the audacity of which is probably unparalleled. A little south of town stood ten ricks of wheat, the property of John Mayrick. Mayrick is comparatively a stranger here, so the sharper had no trouble in passing himself off as owner of the wheat. On the plea of being subject to sunstroke, and therefore unable to work in the hot sun, the unknown man persuaded the threshers to put in a night's work. With the machine were enough teams to haul off the grain as it came from the thresher. At Norwich a grain dealer was waiting to receive the wheat, and by morning the ten ricks had been safely delivered and the money for 1,000 bushels of grain handed over to the alleged owner, who left on the early train and has not been heard of since.

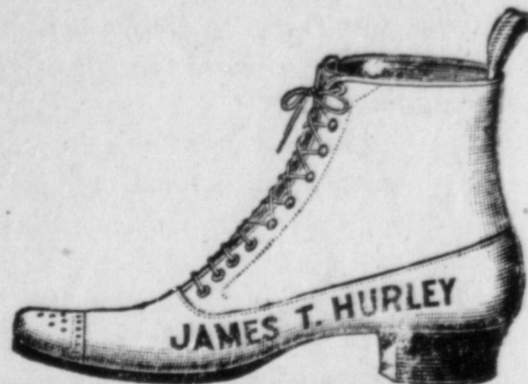

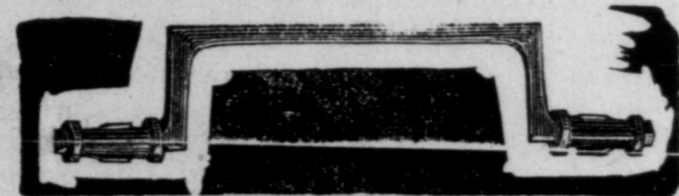
