Cocagne.  
August 31, 1891.—Since my last corres-  
pondence the community of Notre Dame  
has been summoned to mourn the death  
of one of its oldest and most respected  
residents, Mr. James Killian, which oc-  
curred on Thursday, the 27th inst., as the  
result of the injuries referred to in my  
last letter. It is almost unnecessary to  
say that in Mr. Killian's death the parish  
of Notre Dame has met with the loss of  
one of its most honest and upright men,  
and his family have the sympathy of all.

One of the largest and most enthusiastic

of Saturday evening, the 29th inst., the
