

THE CAMPAIGN.

Dr. Stockton, Delivers an Eloquent Address.

A large and happy looking crowd of people assembled in the Temperance Hall, last Monday evening to hear addresses in the interests of the independent candidate by some of the most talented public men in the Maritime Provinces, on the position of New Brunswick as far as local politics are concerned.

Quite a number of ladies occupied seats on the platform. The meeting was a very orderly but enthusiastic one. All the candidates were present, Mr. Gogain occupying a seat on the platform, and Messrs. Barriau and Legere were stationed near the back of the building.

Those present were very much disappointed when it was learned that Dr. Alward and Mr. H. A. Powell—a Kent County boy—would not be present, owing to pressing professional business. Many here on both sides of politics would like to have had the pleasure of hearing those gentlemen, as the majority of the electors of Kent are liberal-minded enough to enjoy hearing both sides of a political or any other question openly and fairly discussed. There are, though, a few political narrow minded bigots, who would like to see choked off all discussion—in the press or elsewhere—adverse to the particular party to which they have attached themselves for the time being.

On motion of Mr. Phinney, M. P. P., Mr. John Jardine, jr., was unanimously elected chairman. After the applause subsided on Mr. Jardine taking the chair, he introduced the speaker of the evening, Dr. Stockton, M. P. P., who after a few primary remarks, launched forth in one of the most eloquent addresses ever heard in Kent, bristling with facts and figures, and the outbursts of applause by the whole house, which frequently interrupted the speaker, were the just homage of an intelligent people to an able and independent public man. He went over the ground traversed by the Attorney General here a short time ago. He was generous and moderate in his arraignment of the government giving credit where merited, but pointed out that some of the measures Mr. Blair had forced through the house were the most disgraceful ever passed by any legislature. He illustrated at what a terrific rate the bonded and floating indebtedness of the Province was being piled up under the present administration, quoting from official reports proving his assertions beyond even the shadow of a doubt and giving an altogether different view of the financial outlook than that of the Attorney General. Reference was also made to railway matters and quite a controversy took place in regard to some minor matters as to time different roads were chartered, etc.

The notorious Northumberland bridge business also came in for some attention. A party, who had originally entered into a contract with the government to build a bridge for \$19,000, had since received some \$14,000 additional, this, it is believed, being one of the conditions of the purchase of the Northumberland members.

A party from Kingston wanted to know, "What about the Ritchie business?" and Dr. Stockton made a most clear and manly explanation of that matter, the entire house, excepting, perhaps, the individual who had the temerity to refer to the matter, giving round after round of the most enthusiastic and hearty applause that has been heard in the old hall for many a long day. He referred to Mr. Melanson's speech in this connection as published in the official report, where he (Melanson) said the attempt to stir up race and religious acrimony by the Attorney General in the house over this matter was the most disgusting exhibition ever witnessed on the floor of our Assembly. What better answer could be given to this than the fact that in the Protestant County of Westmorland he a Roman Catholic and a Frenchman, and Mr. Phinney a Protestant in the Roman Catholic County Kent had both been returned at the head of the poll. This was received by applause by those present irrespective of party, except the enthusiast who had the hardihood to introduce the matter and who took the first opportunity to retire, evidently rather dazed at the result of the explanation. Dr. Stockton pointed out in this connection how the attorney-general had broke faith with him after promising that no action would be taken in this matter without consulting the St. John members, when a few days afterwards the appointment was made and the first they heard of it was when it was made public. Was this the correct way to treat the people's representatives? Over and above the matter of the appointment towered the fact of Mr. Blair's duplicity.

Had Mr. Ritchie occupied the position in place of Mr. Peters he would have followed precisely the same course. He was glad to have an opportunity to address the people of Kent, and it gave him much pleasure to show himself and let the people see that he was not the ogre he was represented to be, and he resumed the review of the different subjects referred to. The speech though eloquent and clear lacked the flowery style indulged in by some public speakers. Dr. Stockton remarked he did not believe in "swallowing an ox to make sure of having a sirloin steak."

Mr. Melmerney, having been invited by the chairman, took the platform for Mr. Leger, and delivered a humorous and eloquent address, his wit and wisdom being much enjoyed.

Mr. Phinney came next. He gave a good speech with telling effect. His reference to Hon. C. H. Labllois' attempt in the southern parishes to stir up the French people and fire the heather; he characterized it as the worst and most despicable canvass ever introduced into politics in the county. He showed how Labllois was ready to sacrifice even his own people at the shrine of Mr. Blair. His explanation of the reasons actuating Mr. Blair in his displacement of Supt. Crockett were opportune and had a good effect as Mr. Crockett is looked on as practically a native of the North Shore.

Mr. Leger followed. He spoke for a few minutes in a very excited and wild way. But afterwards apologized and said the reason he was so excited was that the meeting had been convened secretly and he was not aware that a political gathering was to be held till a short time ago. He never heard a word about it. He would be elected as a councillor for St. Louis against all comers. Mr. Phinney was aware that he would be elected by acclamation as the offer had frequently been made.

Mr. Leger did not explain just why the opposition were in his opinion, holding a secret meeting. He probably thought they could not stand the matchless eloquence of M. Auguste Leger and therefore met secretly. What horrible villains politicians are! Mr. Leger received an ovation in comparison with which that tendered the other speakers paled into utter insignificance.

Mr. M. Barriau was the next and last speaker. He jauntily stepped to the front and made a very neat speech which produced a rather good impression.

Extraordinary Coincidence.
