Fire at Buctouche.

BUCTOUCHE, Dec 22.—A large and very destructive fire occurred here last night. The fire is supposed to have started in a hay mow in the barn of Mr. Gallagher. The buildings destroyed were Wm. Irving's hotel recently occupied by Mr. Hannigan, at the time of the fire Mr. Robert Gallant; ex-Captain officer Renaud's house, occupied by Mr. Peter Gallagher, and Mr. John McDonald's house. Three houses and three barns were destroyed. No furniture was lost, but the contents of the barns were destroyed. The fire started about 11 o'clock. The properties were all new, situated on the Richibucto road, just round the corner. The hotel property loss will be about \$2,500; the Renaud and McDonald properties about \$1,500 each. The Renaud building had \$500 insurance with Mr. J. McSnow. It is not known whether the others were insured.

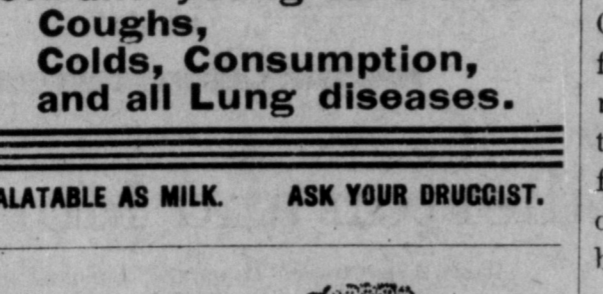

—The St. John Sun, alluding to the receipt of some new potatoes, says:—"When it comes to digging new potatoes by the peck, a fortnight before Christmas, Mr. Friel breaks all previous local record."

—Some men crossed the harbor on the ice for the first time on Friday last, the 18th inst. In 1890 the harbor was crossed on the fourth of December; just two weeks earlier than this year.

—Collector of Customs B. E. Johnson, and Mrs. Geo. V. McInerney, organists of St. Aloysius church, have been made recipients respectively of a handsome meerscham pipe and an elegant gold pencil case.

—A schoolmaster, being called on to give a toast, produced this sentiment:—"Addition to the friends of Old England, subtraction to her wants, multiplication to her blessings, division among her foes, and reduction of her debt and taxes."

—Mr. G. G. King, member elect for Queens has served a notice on the council for the petitioner, Mr. Geo. F. Baird, admitting bribery by agents. This vacates the seat but the petitioner will still go on for the purpose of disqualifying Mr. King, or of obtaining the seat which is claimed by the petitioner.

—Maple sugar making in the middle of December, in New Brunswick, at first sight would simply appear impossible, and yet such a thing might have been accomplished the present month. On the 10th inst., Robert Phillips, Grafton, tapped some maple trees from which the sap flowed freely, a kettle of which Mr. P. sent the Carleton Sentinel, and which was boiled down to honey. —In Presque Isle and Fort Fairfield, Me., potatoes are selling at from sixty-five to seventy-five cents per barrel. The Woodstock Press says, "Notwithstanding a small yield per acre compared with that of last year the market is over stocked, prices very low, and many of the Anostook farmers with no other farm produce for sale." Many of these farmers have heavy bills to pay contracted to procure artificial manures to assist in growing a crop which must now be sold so cheaply. The Press, though published in one of the most fertile districts on the continent does not appear to think much of the market of sixty millions, and says it is perhaps needless to add that our potato market is better than their's, but how long would it remain so were it thrown open to the United States by free trade?

—It is understood that at the next session of the legislature a bill will be introduced making it optional with registrars of deeds and wills to record the documents placed in their hands either by having them typewritten or in the ordinary way. It is said that the writing in the books of some of the registry offices is so badly executed that it is often illegible, and it is thought that by giving registrars the option of typewriting the documents, this difficulty will be largely overcome. We consider it very doubtful, however, that the typewriter would be found much improvement in an office where the incumbent is too lazy or careless to do his work in a legible manner with his pen, as a slovenly operator on a typewriter is an abomination, frequently producing worse results than even a bad penman.
