**Catholicism in New Brunswick.**  
[Condensed from United Canada]  
Coincident with Dr. Sweeney's appoint-  
ment was the division of the diocese of  
St. John, out of which were taken  
the northern counties leaving to  
St. John the county of the same name,  
Charlotte, Albert, Kings, Queens, Sunbury,  
York, Carleton, Westmorland, and the  
southern part of Kent.

The new bishop was born in the county  
of Tyrone, Ireland, in 1821, and came to  
America, when quite young. He was edu-  
cated in St. John, for many years attend-  
ing the grammar school there, of which  
he was an assiduous and diligent student.  
After leaving school in St. John, the  
future bishop entered in a course of  
studies at St. Andrew's College, Charlotte-  
town, and later on went to the Seminary  
of Quebec, in which city he was, in 1844,  
ordained priest. He then returned to St.  
John, where he was stationed by Bishop  
Dollard. He afterwards ministered at  
Sussex, Chatham, and Barachois, where he  
was stationed at the time of his appoint-  
ment to the See of St. John. Soon after  
Dr. Connolly's elevation to that See, the  
talents and merits of Father Sweeney at-  
tracted his attention, the result being that  
the young priest was promoted to the  
Vicar-Generalship of the diocese. His  
episcopal administration has been blessed  
with great length of days and by an extra-  
ordinary growth of religion.

When Dr. Sweeney became Bishop of  
St. John, he found the Cathedral unfinished  
and daily growing too small for the wants  
of his increasing flock. He applied him-  
self, with all energy, to its completion, and  
in three years this great work, with the  
sole exception of the spire, left his hands,  
a thing of finished beauty and joy forever,  
to the Catholics of St. John. An episcopal  
residence was also commenced and pushed  
to completion. Then followed the erection  
of the Sacred Heart Convent, but Bishop  
Sweeney's greatest work was, perhaps, the  
St. Vincent's Orphanage, where hundreds  
of children of both sexes have been cared  
for and made useful, as well as honorable  
members of society. The bishop's next  
most important work was the building of  
the cathedral spire, undertaken and fin-  
ished in 1871. After the fire of 1877, from  
which terrible catastrophe the Catholic  
body suffered severely, Bishop Sweeney  
raised the two splendid structures of St.  
Malachi's Hall and St. Joseph's School.  
By means of a bequest from Mr. Patrick  
McCourt, to whose \$5,000 the bishop added  
\$1,000 from his private purse, there was  
formed the basis of the building funds of  
St. Patrick's Industrial School at Silver  
Falls. At its completion, the boys from  
St. Vincent's Orphanage were transferred  
to Silver Falls, there they, amongst other  
things, were taught farming, and, when  
old enough, were provided with situations.  
A new church in Portland, and another in  
Lower Cove, showed Bishop Sweeney's  
zeal for all portions of his flock. In the  
work of colonization he has also had a  
hand, the settlement of Johnville, in the  
county of Carleton, very fully demon-  
strating his desire to see his people devot-  
ing themselves to the noble pursuits of  
husbandry. The unbroken success of his  
administration merited, in the occasion of  
his silver jubilee, a generous manifestation  
of regard and affection for the bishop of  
St. John, from the clergy and people, as  
well as firm friends and admirers through-  
out the county. That celebration was  
also witness of the splendid ceremony of  
consecration of the wholly completed and  
unindebted cathedral of St. John. The  
laity of the episcopal city presented His  
Lordship with an address.

The diocese of Chatham comprises the  
most Catholic portion of the Province.  
The official census of 1881 gives the fol-  
lowing as the figure of the total and of the  
Catholic portion of the different counties  
forming part of this important ecclesias-  
tical division:

The diocese of Chatham was given for  
his first bishop the Rev. James Rogers,  
born July 11th, 1826, at Mount Charles,  
County Donegal, Ireland, whence, in 1831,  
he came, with his parents to Halifax.  
Educated in St. Mary's College, in that  
city, he made his theological course in the  
Grand Seminary of Montreal. He was  
ordained priest by the Most Rev. Wm.  
Walsh, first Archbishop of Halifax, in St.  
Mary's Cathedral, in that city, July 2nd,  
1851. Father Rogers served in various  
missions of the diocese, Digby, Annapolis,  
Cumberland, and the Island of Bermuda,  
till, in 1859, he was appointed secretary  
to Archbishop Connolly, with a professor-  
ship in St. Mary's College. Named, on  
the 8th of May, 1860, first bishop of the  
diocese of Chatham, N. B., he was on the  
10th of August following, consecrated in  
St. Dunstan's Cathedral, P. E. I. On the  
22nd of the same month, Bishop Rogers  
was installed at Chatham, and found him-  
self, at once, face to face with spiritual  
destitution, material poverty, and physical  
difficulties, which would have appalled  
men of weaker faith and smaller trust in  
God. In his sermon on the occasion of  
the Silver Jubilee of Bishops Rogers and  
McIntyre, His Grace the Archbishop of  
Halifax, said:  
"Twenty-five years ago, my friends, two  
priests in the strength and prime of life  
were duly consecrated in the sanctuary of  
this church. Legitimate apostolic suc-  
cession was theirs. They were placed, not  
by man, but by the Holy Ghost, to rule the  
Church of God. The dignity of episcopal  
office, and the plenitude of sacerdotal  
power were conferred, and all the grave  
responsibilities and cares inseparable from  
the episcopacy were laid on their souls.  
And now that the prime of life is past, now  
that physical vigor has been spent in ful-  
filling noble duties, now that years have  
set the impress of coming age on their  
brows, we—you, my lords and dear  
friends, and I—meet together to celebrate  
their Silver Jubilee, to thank God for  
blessings vouchsafed, and to beseech a  
continuance of them. For twenty-five  
years their lives have been before the eyes  
of you all; their work has been public;  
their virtues and infirmities have been  
exposed to the keen eye of public criticism.  
What need of me to relate the story of  
their episcopacy? It is as an open book  
to all who wish to read. Still, the occa-  
sion, your desires, and my own feelings,  
all demand a brief summing up of their  
life work; and I must ask the lordships  
to pardon, in view of all this, my refer-  
ence to their official actions."

**PINIONED IN DEAD ARMS.**  
The Strange Situation in Which a Son  
Found His Aged Mother.  
ELIZABETH, O., December 14.—The  
McDale family has lived for years in the  
most abject poverty. The mother is past  
80. Beside her the family consisted of a  
son and daughter, each about 50 years of  
age. The mother and daughter slept to-  
gether, the mother being very feeble.  
Early yesterday morning groans from his  
mother's room called the son there to wit-  
ness a blood-curdling sight. During the  
night the daughter had been taken mortally  
ill. In her despair she caught  
her mother in her arms and pin-  
ioned her tightly against her  
breast. At the same time the mother's  
head had been pulled down under the  
covers and bent downward, causing partial  
suffocation. The horror of the situa-  
tion caused her to faint, and while thus  
unconscious the daughter had died hugging  
the mother. The icy arms had stiffened  
in death and the aged victim was held as  
in a vice. Help was summoned,  
but it required the united strength of two  
men to remove the dead woman's arms  
and release the mother, who is so low  
from the shock and choking she received  
that it is scarcely probable that she can re-  
cover.
