Chatham.

The past has been a week of anxiety, not to say one of suppressed excitement, among our fishermen. The river has been teeming with fish, and frozen over above Middle Island, but the Department of Fisheries, 3 years ago, on the complaint of the North West bass fishermen, and the report of its officers here, prohibited absolutely, for three years, any fishing for bass on the North West, and also any smelt fishing anywhere on the river above Middle Island. The position taken by the department seems to be that if they give way or suspend the regulations so as to follow our smelt fishermen to fish above the Island, on the now prohibited district, they will also have to give way and allow fishing for bass on the North West. That is one side. Now for the other, or fishermen's side. Since the regulation was made, three years ago, efforts have been made, from time to time, by those interested in the smelt fishing business, to have it so far relaxed, or changed, to allow a few days fishing opposite the town, or even further up, for the reason that, in the early part of the season, there are few, if any, bass taken in the smelt nets opposite the town or elsewhere, and it is only after the run of smelts is passed that the bass put in an appearance. And the fishermen claim that when there are no bass caught there can be no injury to that important industry. The above contention seems to be borne out by the facts, for, notwithstanding the said regulation, fishing is going on in the prohibited district even now, and, while smelts are being caught, there are very few bass. The demand of the fishermen seem to be a reasonable one, and it is to be regretted that a correspondent in Saturday's World, signing himself "Fair Play," seems more anxious to vent his political spleen than benefit the fishermen, by making the question a political one, when really there is no politics about it, but really we have before us a most unusual spectacle, a government, whose motto is, and has been "Canada for Canadians," forbidding these same Canadians from catching fish at their own door, and thus depriving them of the very necessities of life in some cases, "a very paternal government indeed." The department can't possibly realize the state of things here, or surely it would not be

so pig-headed, in the face of very exceptional circumstances, as to compel, or try to compel, some 300 men, with some thousands of dollars worth of nets and other fishing gear, to stand idly by, while the golden harvest is gradually going out to sea, and the opportunity thus lost can never be regained. It may be said in reply, why not fish below the Island? The answer is easy. There is no ice there. It is rumored that Inspector Chapman, who has been here some days, becoming convinced of the gravity and importance of the situation, sent a somewhat strong despatch to the department, and received a reply telling him no change would be made, and to carry out the regulations. Why, it would take a regiment of soldiers and a battery of Gatling guns to do that now, the feeling is so strong, as the fishermen believe they are being trampled on by the department. Senator Snowball is at present in Ottawa, and we learn a petition has been forwarded to be presented to the department by him, and it is hoped that he will be able to so represent the facts as to obtain some concession to our sorely tried fishermen.

We are pleased to know that MacD. Snowball is slowly recovering from his severe illness.

Since the death of the child of the late Mr. Girvan and little Nora Benson, we have heard of several cases of diphtheria in town, all of which, as far as we can learn, are progressing favorably.

Capt. Thos. Petterson, who commands the Nelson in summer, is now running a stage between Chatham and Newcastle, which is a great convenience to those who travel between the two towns.
