Teacher and Pupil.
A case of some interest to teachers, parents, and school trustees, was tried before stipendiary magistrate Richardson, on Thursday of last week.

It was a complaint under the Summary Convictions Act, made by John H. Wilson, of Bryant Settlement, school district No. 21, Weldford, against Miss McDougall, the teacher, for an assault upon his son, William, a lad 14 years of age, and a pupil in the school.

It appeared from the evidence that the boy had, on several occasions, broken the rule of the school, which required pupils who desired to leave during the afternoon recess, to bring a written excuse from their parents, and, on the afternoon preceding the alleged assault, had gone home without asking the teacher's permission. On the following morning, the teacher spoke of the offence to the boy, who replied in insulting and offensive language, when Miss McDougall slapped him on the head three or four times. While he was being thus punished, the pupil put his slate up to the side of his head, when the teacher took hold of it, and the boy, hauling it away, left a piece of the frame in the teacher's hand. With this, she struck him on the side of the head (the blow, she alleged, being intended for the shoulder, but falling on the head because of his sudden change of position). This left a mark upon the child's ear, which was the cause of the complaint.

Stipendiary Richardson expressed the opinion that the punishment was not by any means excessive, that the language used by the boy called for prompt and somewhat severe punishment, and that Mr. Wilson had in a large measure brought about the trouble by instructing his son to disobey the rules of the school by taking his books and coming home at recess without informing the teacher. If such breach of the rules was permitted, the teacher's authority would soon be destroyed. He therefore dismissed the complaint with costs against the prosecutor, Mr. Wilson. Mr. McInerney appeared on the trial for Mr. Wilson and Mr. Phinney for Miss McDougall.

—On Tuesday last Mr. J. D. Phinney received a cablegram informing him that the bark "Unity," Capt. Ritchie, which is owned at Richibucto, has arrived at Port Natal, Africa, from New York. She has been chartered at a lump sum of £800 for the voyage, to load at Majunga, (Madagascar) and Zanzibar for Boston, U. S. She is expected to sail for Majunga in about ten days.

—S Kirk Murray, son of Alex. Murray of Main River, had a narrow escape from drowning Tuesday morning. He went skating and dropped in where the channel had been open Monday. Wm. Graham, who was crossing the new bridge at the time, gave the alarm at once and a number of men who were at a school meeting at Mr. Murray's, made their way to the young man and by the aid of a pole soon rescued him. A few minutes longer and he would have been too exhausted to have kept his hold on the ice.

—A Boston correspondent says: The weather is very warm, especially for the fish business. Large quantities of smelt are coming in every day. C. P. Curtis & Co. are receiving the largest consignments. Our correspondent thinks it looks like a "put up job" on the part of the railways insisting that the freight and duty be paid in advance, so they need not hurry cars loaded with frozen fish to market, as their freight is already paid. The poor man who ships the fish sometimes loses all owing to such delay. Some shipments were delayed three days, the result being they were almost worthless when they arrived and tons had to be condemned.

—The old iron steamer, Rothesay Castle, which used to run on the route between Shediac and Campbellton, calling at Richibucto, Chatham, &c., has recently been broken up at Toronto. This steamer was built for a blockade runner during the American war, and has quite a history, on one occasion a cannon ball piercing the cut water just below the water line. She was burned to the water line while lying at the wharf at Point du Chene some years ago. On being rebuilt she was purchased by Toronto parties for service on the lakes. The mention of this old steamer's name recalls the "good old days" before the I. C. R. was built, when either by stage or "boat" all the passenger and freight carrying business of the northern portion of the province was carried on during the summer months, and woe to the community that neglected to lay in a sufficient stock of heavy provisions during the time navigation was open, flour often reaching famine prices when the stock would run low towards spring. This was felt more especially at the more northern parts as it had to be hauled by horses from Shediac, Campbellton and Dalhousie, often sending all the way to Quebec for a new supply. Many of our readers will remember, on occasions like the above, the enthusiastic welcome given the old Rothesay on her first arrival with a full cargo in the spring, as well as the sad adieu when the last call for the season would be made some months later.
