

population in St. John, that, although the Catholics had, besides St. Malachi's commodious church, edifices in Carleton and Portland, the congregation attending St. Malachi's was often so large that only a portion could gain admission to the building. One of the first steps taken by Dr. Connolly was to secure increased church room for his people. His selection of a site for the new cathedral admirably proved the wisdom and foresight of the gifted prelate. He had faith in St. John's growth and future, and made choice of a site then wild and remote in character, but which time has shown to have been the best that could have been decided on. The plans of the new church edifice were prepared in New York by Mr. Charles F. Anderson, a well known church architect, and the foundation stone laid with the usual expressive ceremonies and before an immense concourse of people, in May, 1853. On Christmas day, 1855, to the joy of all the Catholics of St. John, the new church was blessed and the Holy Sacrifice from that time continuously offered up within its walls. The extreme length of the great building is 200 feet, its width in the transepts 116 feet, in the nave about 80 feet, while its height, from the ground to the top of the cross on the spire, is 230 feet. It is a building which, as the St. John Telegraph justly claimed, would attract attention in any city. It is built of native limestone, neatly dressed, with sandstone trimmings, the coping course, the tower, and the trimmings on the end facing the east, being all of sandstone.

Not long after the appointment of Dr. Connelly, news came that the Very Rev. Father John Sweeney, V. G., and parish priest of Barachois, had been chosen third Bishop of St. John. The news of this appointment was received with great satisfaction by the Catholics of the whole province, but especially those of St. John, who were well acquainted with the zealous ability of the bishop elect.

Buctouche Notes.

A snow plough is being built for the Moncton & Buctouche line. Mr. Hiram Thompson is superintending the work.

The Methodist church has lately been furnished with a new set of window blinds. Mr. Hiram Thompson made the church a present of a pair of tastefully finished lamp stands, which are now fixed upon the pulpit platform.

The smelt catching which ceased for a while during the soft weather has recommenced. Messrs. J. D. Irving & Co. sent off a car load. Mr. Loggie has also sent off a quantity.

Dr. King built a house this fall which adds very much to the appearance of the place. He moved into it a few days ago. All the schooners belonging to this place have arrived safely and are laid up for the winter.

Naval Volunteer Corps.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—The Admiralty officials recently came to the conclusion that the number of men available for active service in time of war would not be sufficient to form complements for all the vessels which would be called into service if a mobilization of the naval strength were attempted, therefore a serious difficulty would arise from the want of men. The reserves among the merchant seamen and fishermen would hardly more than suffice to furnish crews for the armed mercantile cruisers into which a number of passenger liners would be converted in case of hostilities. A committee was appointed to enquire into the circumstances, and after a careful secret investigation they have made a report embodying a plan for the formation of a new auxiliary force, by means of which it is expected the defect referred to will be remedied. An appeal to patriotism is to be made, and extra inducements are offered for the purpose of obtaining volunteers for the new organization, which is to be styled "The Marine Volunteer Corps." Inland and coast towns alike are invited to organize branches of the corps. Men from the existing infantry volunteers are allowed to join the marine volunteer corps on condition that they consent to make a short cruise every year and to hold themselves liable to active service afterward in time of war. This clause is necessary, because, according to terms of their enlistment, the existing volunteers are not liable to service outside of Great Britain, while as members of the marine volunteer corps they may be called upon to go to any part of the globe. It is expected that the new corps will prove a popular one, and that it will remedy what threatened to be a source of weakness in England's naval force.

Principal Grant on Political Corruption.

KINGSTON, Ont. Nov. 30.—Rev. Principal Grant addressed St. Andrew's Society last night. He said Canada could assimilate all people if they came with a desire to build up, if they left old feuds in lanes they hailed from. He who stands aloof on the ground that politics are dirty is exhibiting a sickly pharisaism. If politics are dirty they should clean them. If they gave their votes at the bid of party they showed signs of cowardice and abdicated their manhood. To sell their influence for private ends, or for a bribe of money, or to ride in a carriage, or for a promise of local work, is a sin of high treason to themselves and to their country. One or more of these sins will as surely dam their souls as drunkenness or any other form of sin. How many church members are guilty? Or need it be asked how many are not? The duties of Canadians to seek peace were mentioned. He called for loyalty to the flag of the Empire, for fidelity to national existence, and to the fundamental principles of the constitution. There is no time for listening to verbal constitution smashing. He pleaded for good feeling between all creeds in Canada, and especially between the French and English. People of the same blood did not understand each other, and it was no wonder then that the English and French-speaking Canadians seldom do justice to each other, and that demagogues are exciting suspicion in the popular mind in each section of the country. May God give them some inspired leaders able to appreciate the solid worth and manifold graces of their French-speaking countrymen. They are the very kernel of this country. Canada is more to them than it is to the English-speaking people because they have been longer here and have struck roots deeper in the soil. There could be no Canada without cordial friendship between the French and English-speaking people.
