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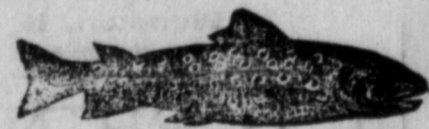

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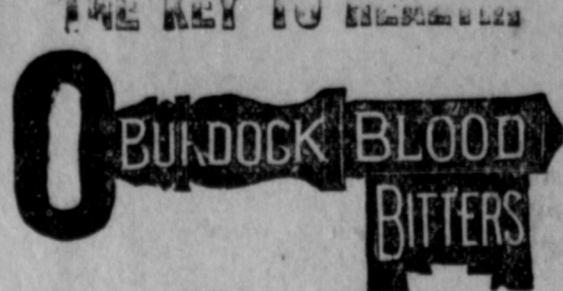

The Prince of Wales has been Grand Master of the English Grand Lodge of Freemasons for seventeen successive years and will be nominated for the office again this year.

There is at least one man in the world who welcomes the wolf to his door. He lives in North Dakota, and has caught eleven wolves in his traps this fall, for which he receives a bounty.

Breen, of St. John, has challenged any man in the world to skate him, McCormick or Laidlaw preferred, and has posted a \$50 forfeit for the race. He has accepted a challenge of Franklin's published in a New York paper to skate any man in the world.

Governor-elect Fowler of New York had a plurality of exactly 47,937, and a city carpenter who guessed it to a vote got the \$200 the New York Herald offered to the person who made the best guess. There were nearly three-quarters of a million guesses made in all.

Typhoid fever is raging in certain parts of Maine, notably in Bangor, and the city officials are at a loss to account for its presence. It is usually discovered in such cases that poor drainage or polluted drinking water is responsible for such epidemics, and those are the lines to which it would seem that investigation avails little.

Depending on natural gas is a trifle dangerous. In consequence of an accident in Wapakoneta, Ohio, the town is without fuel. There is not a carload of fuel in the place, and not enough wood to prepare supper. Hundreds of families are without fire and there is great suffering. It will be several days before the gas is turned on.

Rev. Toy H. Lee, a well-known Chinese missionary of Boston, was married in Chelsea, on Tuesday, to Miss Martha H. Comstock, a teacher of drawing in the Charlestown district. The ceremony was attended by a large number of ladies and gentlemen prominent in religious circles in that section. Rev. Lawrence Phelps, of the First Congregational church of Chelsea, in which the Chinese Sunday school of which the bride is a teacher, officiated. Mr. Lee is the only Chinese missionary in Boston.

The British trade and navigation returns for the first nine months of the present year show that there was a falling off of about £9,400,000 in exports from the United Kingdom as compared with a corresponding period last year. Of this decrease only a little more than one-third was in Exports to the United States, and this is fully accounted for by the abnormal exports of the September of 1890 in anticipation of the McKinley tariff. The figures for this year show an increase of £2,000,000 over those for the same nine months of 1889.

There was exhibited at Greenport L. I., last week a machine which is expected to revolutionize the lumber business. This machine cuts lumber without any waste, and there is no sawdust whatever. In cutting lumber with a saw there is a great loss which goes into sawdust. The new invention is designed to cut thin boards and planks, and will cut in different thicknesses varying from one thirty-second of an inch to an inch. The saving in lumber that it will effect will be very great. It is said that in small lumber, one-quarter and one-half an inch in thickness, one-quarter of the log is lost in sawdust; then another eighth is lost in planing, and the lumberman in preparing his lumber for use loses three-eighths of his log. This new invention will save all that. The machine cuts cherry, ash, birch and maple, in thicknesses from a sixteenth to a half an inch. The machine is intended to be placed in the woods and to cut the trees as soon as they are felled. Green wood is cut more easily than seasoned wood, but logs were cut up that had lain in the yard ten years. The machine weighs forty tons.

A direct blow at Canadian pessimism is given in the following figures regarding the ship-building industry of Nova Scotia: "In 1887 Nova Scotia built 87 vessels, 12,300 tons; in 1888 Nova Scotia built 116 vessels 13,900 tons; in 1889 Nova Scotia built 106 vessels, 16,645 tons; in 1890 Nova Scotia built 148 vessels, 33,746 tons. Some of the vessels lately turned out in Nova Scotia yards are among the largest and finest wooden vessels afloat.
