TWO INTERESTING ELECTIONS.

Two more than usually interesting elections are presently to come off in Ireland, one in Kilkenny, to fill the seat vacated by the death of Pope Hennessy, the other in Cork, to replace Mr. Parnell. Together they will show whether or no the Parnellite party retains any considerable show of strength. Davitt will try his luck in Kilkenny as an anti-Parnellite. John E. Redmond, one of Parnell's chief lieutenants, will try his chances in Cork. It may be assumed that Davitt will win in Kilkenny; but the result in Cork seems uncertain. Should Redmond win, or even nearly win, the conclusion will be that Parnellism will remain a factor to be dealt with in the home rule struggle. Should Redmond fail, and fail badly, the early death of Parnellism pure and simple will be looked for.

EXODED.

The whereabouts of Mr. Robert McGreevy and of Mr. Owen Murphy, celebrated witnesses in the Tarte-McGreevy boodle case, is a matter of interest to many people. They are not to be found in their accustomed haunts. They have for many months filled conspicuous positions. First, they challenged the attention of the civilized world in the witness box. Then, they attracted notice in the criminal dock, charged with conspiracy to wrest four hundred thousand dollars from a man without consideration paid, taking advantage of some fool's play about a pretended note of hand. On Friday last, a verdict of guilty was rendered against them, and being found absent from the court of justice, they were badly wanted. Searched for, they could not be laid hold of. They had evidently departed from the latest scene of their exploits, gone to the land of the free. Better spared than better men. Perhaps hereafter nobody will attach much importance to those portions of their evidence at Ottawa on which they were not corroborated. They are a notable pair.

THE ENGLISH NATIONAL GAME.

Cricket may almost be considered the national game of England, as baseball seems to be that of the United States though in both countries football commands much attention. Football, especially as played across the Atlantic, is a rather violent game, too often attended by fatal accidents. The younger English excel in cricket, and they seem to find in its field the demand for skill and activity that commends the game to their favor. Now and then, some of their crack cricket teams are defeated in Australia, in the United States, or in Canada. But, for the most part, their choicest teams have it all their own way when they play abroad. A fine team, captained by Lord Hawke, is now sweeping all before it at the principal points in the Upper Provinces.

PACAUD'S LITTLE STORY.

When the Baie des Chaleurs steal came before a senate committee, Mr. Pacaud was summoned to come before it. Instead of so doing, hastily withdrawing from the banks checks that told their own story plainly, he fled by sea far and away; and remained away till said committee had closed its labours, and Parliament had been prorogued. But lately, he has been rushing things in another direction. Watching the proceedings of the commission at Quebec painfully forcing its way in search of the facts of the steal. Mr. Pacaud grew impatient and almost demanded to be allowed to unboosom. He was gratified, and at the close of the week, told his well prepared little story in the witness box. Well, as to the hundred thousand, had he taken it? Oh yes, he had allowed Armstrong to force it upon him, and he had placed much of it where it was needed to do most good. Some \$24,000 went for Liberal election purposes. Some \$10,000 into Provincial secretary's hands. In the course of his story, he implicated a lot of Cabinet ministers: up to the elbow, but he sought to exonerate Mr. Mercier. True, he had sent him a five thousand dollar bill of exchange, bought with the boodle money, but then, Mr. Mercier had entrusted him on his departure for France with a large sum of money, to be used at his discretion. According to him, Mr. Mercier had no responsibility at all in the case. At the moment of writing, Pacaud has not undergone his cross examination. It was to begin on Tuesday. If it has been as

searching and masterly as opportunity offered, and necessity demanded, the tale ere this has been greatly amended, not to say expanded. But as it fell first from the witnesses lips it proclaimed ruin to the Mercier government.

Strange to say, while New Brunswick's grain crops this year has been almost the best she ever raised, her potato crop has been almost the worst. The weakness betrayed by the potato in these late years has involved the farmers in temperate climates in heavy losses. No effectual remedy seems available—a fact much to be deplored.

The Bathurst Fire.

BATHURST, Oct. 26.—A disastrous fire broke out last night about 12 o'clock and consumed several important buildings. The fire originated in the basement of H. Mehan & Co., on Water street. It burned rapidly and consumed the building with all its contents before anything but the books could be saved. The flames having once gained headway spread to the adjoining buildings and crossed the street. The stores kept by Messrs. Donnelly & Hickson, and Mrs. Sinclair were destroyed with most of their contents. The Merchants' Bank of Halifax building, the Curling Rink and the dwelling houses of Kennedy F. Burns, M. P. and James Hickson were also destroyed. The Power Hotel was badly damaged. The stock of the Burns drug store was removed. The insurance companies interested, are the Western, Liverpool, London & Globe, British American, North West Union, Citizens, City of London and the Quebec. K. F. Burns, M. P., residence was insured in the Western for \$2500, his furniture for \$700, and piano for \$400; total of \$3,600. The Hickson dwelling was insured for \$800 in the same office, the curling rink for \$500, the Power building \$500, Kerr's \$250, Mehan's \$450. There was \$4000 insured on Messrs. Mehan's stock. Most of the losses are pretty well covered by insurance.

The Bathurst Courier says there is no doubt in the public mind that the fire was the work of an incendiary. The Courier refers to the finding of inflammable material under the platform leading to the store of Samuel Bishop, and also to the fact that the walls of Kent & Williamson's building were covered with oil.

Getting Rid of Fleas.

A correspondent of the Washington Star, who has been studying the subject of getting rid of fleas, gives this as the result of his investigations: If those who are troubled with this insect will place the common adhesive fly paper on the floors of the rooms infested, with a small piece of fresh meat in the center of each sheet, they will find that the fleas will jump towards the meat and adhere to the paper. I completely rid a badly infested house in two nights by this means.

The cut of spruce will therefore be much smaller than last year, and that of cedar very much larger. The manufacturing of shingles has become quite an industry on the North Shore.
