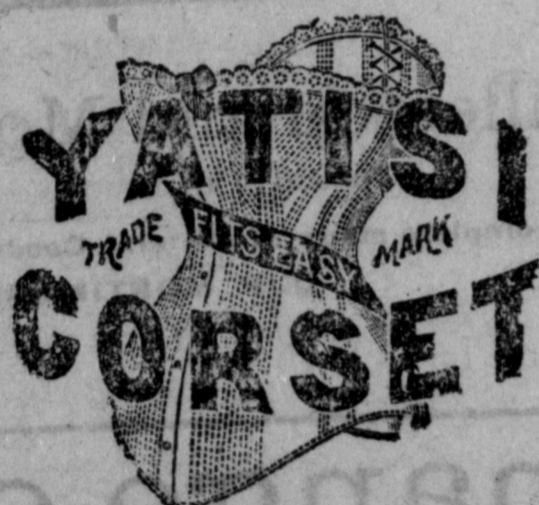

NUGGETS.

—Read McAfee & Loomer's new advertisement on page 2.

—Illegal lobster fishing, it is said, is being carried on at Cape Tormentine.

—The editor of the Newcastle Advocate, Mr. Wm. C. Anslow, was in town this week.

—A Nova Scotia paper reports oats as a very large crop, and says they will sell cheaper this winter than they have for years.

—Hon. J. B. Snowball's steamer St. Nicholas, has been engaged by the Dominion Government to enter the fisheries protection service for the winter.

—We are pleased to report that Mr. Jas. Flanagan, dry goods merchant of Moncton, has returned home much improved in health after his visit to Boston.

—The very high tide which accompanied the storm on Friday did considerable damage along the shore, carrying adrift lumber, etc., piled on some of the wharves.

—St. John had six inches of snow Saturday morning. Scarcely enough fell in Richibucto to whiten the pavements, although some ten or twelve miles further north three or four inches fell.

—The bark Codan, which ran ashore while being towed over the bar by the Victor on Wednesday night last, was rendered a total wreck by the storm of Friday last, and will be sold at auction on Friday next.

—The auction sale of hay etc., at Robt. Kerr's (farmer) Bay du Vin River, has been postponed till Monday, 26th, same hour and place, on account of rain storm on Tuesday last.

—L'Evangeline says that the oldest Acadian priest in the Maritime Provinces is the Abbe William Morin Leblanc. As Mr. Leblanc was born on Oct. 5, 1836, it will be seen that he is yet a mere youth. He has been a priest twenty-five years.

—The federal census of Victoria B. C., gives that city a population of 16,841. The people of Victoria were not satisfied with this enumeration and took one under the auspices of the city council which shows that Victoria has 22,981 inhabitants.

—A New Mills correspondent of the Advocate says:—Rev. J. A. Greenlees who preached some very stirring and eloquent sermons for the past few Sundays has been given a call to the circuit, which it is to be hoped, he will accept. Mr. Greenlees appears a very earnest Scotchman. His ready wit and pleasing manners make him a favorite with all he comes in contact with.

—The export of lumber this season is far less than last, much being held over in anticipation of better prices. Messrs. J. & T. Jardine have shipped about 3,000,000 sp. ft., holding over for another year 2,000,000 sp. ft.; Mr. Geo. K. McLeod over 10,000,000 sp. ft.; Mr. Edward Walker 800,000 sp. ft.; while Mr. Martin Lanigan, who still holds 500,000 sp. ft., has sold 1,000,000 sp. ft. or upwards.

—Railroad men from the North say that the small ox is on the increase near Campbellton and on the Quebec shore, and that instructions have been given to train officials to use every precaution to prevent a spread of the disease. A number of the conductors carry bottles of carbolic acid with which they disinfect the cars when passengers from the infected districts are taken aboard.—Globe.

—The net weight of a barrel of turnips at G. G. Slipp's store on Saturday was found to be 131 lbs. We do not know whether this is a heavy or light weight, but the remarkable thing about this particular barrel is that it only contained seven turnips; average weight, 18 5/7 lbs. The largest one weighed 21 1/2 lbs. The turnips were raised by C. L. S. Raymond, to whom we refer any who desire to know anything more about them.—Woodstock Sentinel.

—The Canadian Journal of Fabrics says:—"Mr. Peter McSweeney, dry goods merchant of Moncton, writes us as follows regarding trade there:—"Trade in our city is on the mend. I think we have struck bottom and now are on the up grade, but payments are still slow. Our cash sales, on the contrary, are better than last year. September is fully twenty per cent. ahead of last year. October has opened out well; we have had fine harvest weather, and importations are smaller than last year both in this province and in Nova Scotia.

—Chatham World: The old Moorfield burial ground, opposite Chatham, has many quaint epitaphs that have never been published, most of which are almost obliterated. Here is one that was recently deciphered:
