Quebec.

QUEBEC, Oct. 27.—The announcement is made semi-officially that as a result of Pacand's statement Hon. Chas. Langelier, provincial secretary, though he does not himself think he had done anything wrong, is seriously considering the advisability of retiring, and has intimated to the premier that he intends to offer his portfolio for the latter's disposal. But it is by no means certain that if this should happen that Mercier would accept it, but it is doubtful if there will be sufficient time before the session, as the House must meet before December 29. Should the Mercier government be dismissed it is understood pretty well that Hon. Mr. Deboucherville will be called upon to form a new ministry, but the Liberals here are confident that Lieut.-Gov. Angers will not dare to dismiss them in view of the present complications at Ottawa and the result of the Royal Commission's enquiry which they already anticipate as favorable to the Mercier government. It is understood that Mr. Charles Langelier will ask permission of the Royal Commission to-day to make a solemn declaration, and that Mr. Mercier will take the stand to-morrow.

TORONTO, Oct. 17.—The Globe publishes an interview with Mercier, in which the Quebec premier indicates clearly his expectation that a general election will soon take place, and that he will come back to power with possibly a reduced but certainly a sufficient majority.

Postmaster General Wanamaker announces the arrival in the United States, from Canada, of circulars offering to sell \$6 worth of Louisiana lottery tickets for October drawing for \$5. An investigation has proved that the affair was a fraud and forgery, and it was intended to arrest C. J. McCullough, a stylish dressed young American, who, for a couple of months past, has been residing at Toronto as the culprit, but he skipped. The matter was reported to the county town attorney, who put the whole affair into the hands of the police. It would be thought that even the most venient would scarcely be taken in by such an obvious swindle, but it has been found that the swindlers got rid of about \$10,000 worth of forged tickets.
