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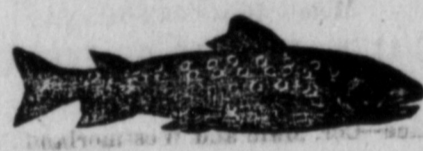

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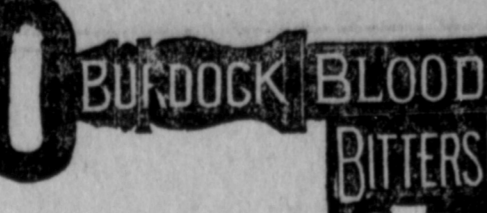

"Lead Us Not Into Temptation."

In the year 184—, we chanced to be spending a few days in a beautiful inland country town in Pennsylvania. It was court week and to relieve us from the somewhat monotonous incidents of village life, we stepped into the court room, where the court had convened.

Among the prisoners in the box, was a lad of but tender years, whose sad and pensive countenance, caused him to look sadly out of place among the hardened criminals by whom he was surrounded. Close by the box, and manifesting the greatest interest in the proceedings, sat a tearful woman, whose anxious glance from the judge to the boy left us no room to doubt that it was his mother. We turned in sadness from the scene to enquire of the offence of the prisoner, and learned that he was accused of stealing money.

The case was soon commenced, and by the interest manifested by that large crowd we found that our heart was not the only one in which sympathy for the lad existed. How we pitied him! The bright smile had vanished from his face and now it expressed more the cases of age. His young sister—a bright-eyed girl—had gained admission to his side, and cheered him with the whisperings of hope. But that sweet voice which before had caused his heart to bound with happiness added only to the grief his shame had brought upon him.

The progress of the case acquainted us with the circumstances of the loss, the extent of which was but a dime—no more! The lad's employer, a wealthy, miserly, and unprincipled manufacturer, had made use of it for the purpose of what he called 'testing the boy's honesty.' It was placed where from its very position the lad would of necessity see, and least suspect the trap. A day passed, and the master, to his mortification, not pleasure, found the coin untouched. Another day passed and yet his object was not gained. A simple present for that little sister was purchased with it. These circumstances were sustained by several of the employer's workmen, who were also parties in the plot. An attorney urged upon the jury the necessity of making the little rogue an example to others by punishment. His address had great effect upon all who heard it. Before, I could see many tears of sympathy with the lad, his widowed mother and his faithful sister. But their eyes were all dry now, and none looked as if they cared for aught else but a conviction. The accuser sat in a conspicuous place, smiling, as if in fiend-like exultation over the misery he had brought upon that poor but happy trio.

"We felt that there was but little hope for the boy; and the youthful appearance of the attorney who had volunteered his defence gave no encouragement—as we learned that it was the young man's maiden plea—his first address. He appeared greatly confused and reached to a desk near him, from which he took the Bible that had been used to solemnize the testimony. This movement was received with general laughter and taunting remarks—among which we heard a fellow close by us say, 'He forgets where he is. Thinking to hold some ponderous look-book, he has made a mistake and got the Bible.'

The remark made the young attorney flush with anger, and turning his flashing eye upon the audience, he convinced them that it was no mistake, "saying justice wants no other book." His justice was gone, and instantly he was calm as the sober Judge upon the bench.

The Bible was opened, and every eye was turned upon him, as he quietly and leisurely turned over the leaves amidst a breathless silence, he read to the jury this sentence:

"Lead us not into temptation."

We felt our heart throb at the sound of these words. The audience looked at one another without speaking, and the jury mutely exchanged glances, as the appropriate quotation carried its moral. Then followed an address whose influence was like magic. We saw the guilty accuser leave the room in fear of personal violence—the mother smiled again—and before its conclusion there was not an eye in the Court that was not moist. The speech affecting to that degree which caused tears, held its hearers spellbound.

The little time that was necessary to transpire before the verdict of the jury could be learned, was a period of great anxiety and suspense. But when the whispering consultation, and those happy words, "Not guilty," came from the foreman, they passed like a thrill of electricity from lip to lip.

The young lawyer's first plea was a successful one. He was soon a favorite, and now represents his district in the councils of the Commonwealth. The lad increased his grateful remembrances, and we, by the affecting scene herein attempted to be described, have been often led to think how manifold greater is the crime of the tempter than that of the tempted.

THE WORLD OVER.

The Electrical Review some time ago described a new system of electric railway. A steam engine and dynamo are carried in a vehicle, which takes the place of the present locomotive. Conductors which pass beneath the cars carry the current to a series of electric motors, which drive all or some of the axles. The proposed engine is a triple expansion, and the boiler is capable of developing six hundred horse power. The minor details are elaborately stated, and it is hoped that a speed on gradients of one to two hundred, and seventy-five to eighty miles on the level will be attained. Experiments are to be made on the French state railways.

The Russian famine has extended to Siberia owing to the difficulty of transportation. Efforts at relief seem almost helpless. Advances from the interior of the empire are continually of worse import. People are commencing to riot in Samara, Saratoff and Voronez.

While Wm. Clearly and James Canning were deer hunting in North Hastings, Ont., Canning mistook his comrade for a deer and shot him dead.

A New York clergyman has married 12,000 couples and received over \$60,000 wedding fees.

While the box containing the coffin and body of Francis C. Smith was lying on the station platform at Sussex awaiting the train Wednesday, some individual stole the railway ticket which was attached to the coffin box. The thief was not discovered.

While Henri Thibeault was taking a coffin containing the dead body of a child to the cemetery, at Montreal, he got drunk. The horse ran away, throwing Thibeault and the coffin down the steep embankment. Both were picked up by the police and taken to the police station. Thibeault's son was sent for to bury the child.

Latest advice from Amoy, China, give details of the terrible epidemic of cholera prevailing there. Hundreds of people have died and many English and American missionaries have succumbed to the disease. The Chinese are dying by the hundreds and the natives, instead of taking preventive measures, have recourse to worship the god of sickness and death. Large sums of money have been subscribed to burn sacrifices and to act theatrical plays to please the terrible deity.

The Russian nobility are in comparatively as wretched circumstances as the peasantry. In October there will be nearly 900 estates belonging to nobles sold by auction at the instance of the state bank that has loaned them money on mortgages.

Dr. Smith, of the Tracadie, N. B., lazarretto, visited Lake O'Law last week and examined a case of leprosy. The person afflicted with this terrible disease is a young woman named Harris, and who has been confined to bed for a number of years. It is said that the woman is too far gone with the disease to be removed, and that death will undoubtedly relieve her of her sufferings in a short time. This is the only case known in Lake O'Law.—Sydney Herald.

Letters patent have been granted incorporating Phillip J. McNally, Eugene Robichaud, Adolphe Ache, U. C. Trudel, Dosite Chaisson, and others of Shippegan, for the purposes of the manufacture of lumber of all kinds, and flour. The company have a total capital of \$10,000, divided into 1,000 shares of \$10 each.

The Truro Sun was the first printing office in Nova Scotia to be lighted by electricity, and now it is the first to be heated by steam, from a central station distant about 1,000 feet.
