CANAL EXTENSION.

The Dominion government has decided on the construction of a fourteen mile canal on the north bank of the St. Lawrence between lakes St. Louis and Francis, at a probable cost of \$4,760,770.

Wheat Raising in Kent County.

Mr. Editor: With this I send you a few extracts from the note books of the owners of threshing mills, giving the wheat crop of a number of farmers on the Richibucto River and neighborhood, recording splendid returns, and considered the best wheat crop grown in Kent Co.

Table with 3 columns: Name, Bushels raised, Average bushels sown. Includes G. & J. Robertson, Robert Lawson, Frank Plume, etc.

John Adair had in one field six bushels sown, which yielded 130 bushels, giving average yield 21 1/2 to each bushel sown, which "takes the cake."

The foregoing facts collected by our correspondent supplies food for reflection and will, we trust, have the effect as suggested of encouraging the farmers of New Brunswick, especially Kent County, to raise their own breadstuffs.

The following figures compiled from the report of the United States Department of Agriculture and other sources give the yield of wheat to the acre in the following places for the years 1882 to 1889 inclusive:

It appears by the above that Mr. John Adair raised in one field 130 bushels from 6 bushels sown. Presuming that two bushels were sown to the acre gives a yield of 43 1/2 bushels to the acre, which is considerably above Western Canada and the Western States.

"Whaleback."

The Scientific American describes an ambitious attempt to utilize the "whaleback" model for transatlantic navigation. It says that an enormous whaleback with a raised deck or platform providing accommodation for 720 first-class passengers is now building at Wilmington, Del.

A Terrible Outrage in the Office of a Millionaire.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—A terrible explosion occurred at 12.20 yesterday in the Arcade building, southwest corner of Broadway and Rector street. The noise and shock was caused by a dynamite bomb that had exploded in the office of Russel Sage, the millionaire financier and railroad magnate, who occupied rooms 38 and 39 second floor.

Just inside the door of the general office was found the body of a man with his head severed from the trunk. The whole lower part of the body was shattered to pieces. The right arm and left leg were missing. The remains are supposed to be those of H. D. Wilson, who threw the bomb. He seems to be the only person killed outright.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—W. D. Southworth, who came from San Francisco some time ago, was arrested here yesterday. It is thought he knows something about the bomb throwing in Russell Sage's office, and that he belongs to an organized band of conspirators in this city who have sworn to kill monopolists.
