When Pluck Was Slung.

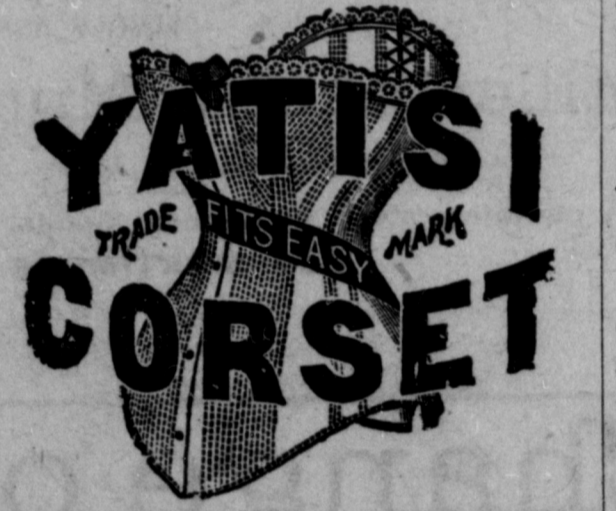
