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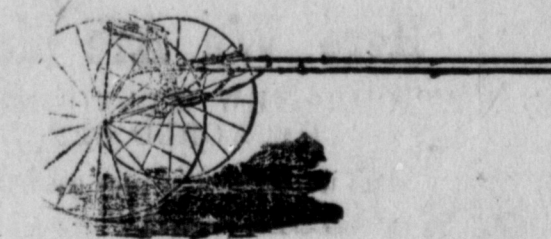

Koong-see, that with her own hands she assisted in building the house, while her husband, applying himself to agricultural pursuits, brought the island into a high state of cultivation. The peaceful inhabitants of the island were quite unprepared; but Chang, having refused the parties admittance, was run through the body, and mortally wounded. His servants, who were much attached to him, fought bravely to defend their master; but when they saw him fall, they threw down their weapons and fled. Koong-see, in despair, rushed to her apartments, which she set on fire, and perished in the flames.

No children scattered scented paper over his grave; but in pity to Koong-see and her lover, they were transformed into two immortal doves, emblems of the constancy which had rendered them beautiful in life, and in death undivided.

The Evangeline Question.

We have received a copy from the New York Journal of Commerce of the 12th inst., with another of Mr. J. Williams' entertaining letters, descriptive of the press trip through Nova Scotia. Mr. W. writes with evident appreciation of the country, and has the advantage, of course, of knowing more about it than most of the other members of the party, being an old Yarmouthian. One of the gentlemen, writing on Windsor, spoke of visiting the residence of the late Judge Haliburton, who "was a writer on political subjects under the name of Sam Slick." Mr. Williams speaks of the same visit as follows:—

"Judge Haliburton, (Sam Slick), one of the most prominent men of letters yet produced in British North America. The historic Haliburton estate, with its picturesque and charming one story mansion of vast area, embowered in primeval trees, is still the objective point of pilgrims to this part of Acadie although it has passed out of possession of the family. A portrait of the celebrated jurist and litterateur, painted when he was young, bears little resemblance to him as I saw him when a middle-aged man, on the bench of the Supreme Court sitting in Yarmouth, accept the conventional present of white kid gloves when there was no case on the docket, and adjourn the court."

Referring to the visit to Wolfville, he says:—"Through a lapsus lingui a funny incident occurred in the address of Professor Jones. In referring to Grand Pre, he said if there had been no Longfellow there would have been no Evangeline. Dr. Sawyer interrupted to correct the professor of history to say that he was mistaken, that Grand Pre and Evangeline were historic before Longfellow was born. The professor acknowledged the slip, and said everybody knew what he meant—that without Longfellow there would have been no history of Evangeline."

In justice to Professor Jones, it should be remembered that Dr. Sawyer only could have spoken in jest, as the "professor of history" was historically accurate in his first statement. Evangeline was a character of romance not of history, although the romance was suggested by history. Evangeline lived only in Longfellow's imagination, and the disappointment of tourists in failing to find the ex-

act spot of the old forge, the old church, etc., are due to the fact that too many people of the United States really do not know that Evangeline is but a work of fiction. The public are about surfeited with Evangeline business anyway, while the interesting stories of Nova Scotia and grand characters in her history and the world's history are lost sight of by those who aim at imparting instruction on matters provincial.—Yarmouth Times.
