LONDON, Sept. 26.-The Standard's Vienna correspondent records a discussion which was carried on at the table of the Archduke Albrecht during the Austrian military manœuvres as to whether it would be wise to allow a known enemy to complete preparations for war or whether it was not preferable to force a conflict. "No names were mentioned," in every section. says the correspondent, "but all understood that Russia was meant."

Emperor William said emphatically "I strongly believe that the enormous responsibility which modern warfare imposes must override all military theories I would not begin war if conscious that by delaying it I could secure a single year, nay, a single month, of peace by trusting in the success of my good cause. Even if the chances are equal on both sides, there is much to be gained by having several months of peace." The king of Saxony expressed himself to the same effect, pointing out instances where diplomacy had averted an apparently inevitable conflict.

Archduke Albrecht also dilated upon the enormous responsibility of forcing a war, in view of the murderous perfection of modern weapons.

The correspondent says Emperor William's remarks made a deep impression on the high rank German and Austrain officers present.

A letter upon the Younghusband incident is published here from Armimus Vambery, the distinguished Oriental traveller and writer, who in 1861-64 travelled in the disguise of a dervish by routes unknown to Europeans through the deserts of the Oxus to Khiva and thence by Bokhara to Samarcand. Professor Vambery is professor of Oriental languages at the University of Pesth and he has for years past written letter after letter to the Times and other newspapers warning the British Government and the people of England against the designs of

### Russia in regard to India. An American's Compiaint.

The superiority of American travelling accommodations is amusingly illustrated by the wail of a New York gentleman, who relates the following incident in a pathetic letter to a London morning paper. He was travelling from London to Scotland alone, in a first-class carriage. At least he remained in solitude for the first six hours of his journey and then the door of his compartment was opened, and, to his horror, a well dressed woman entered accompanied by a nursemaid carrying a baby.

They arranged their baggage so as to make a couch for the youngster to recline upon, and then, without the slighest apology to the American, proceeded to make baby's toilet. Out of a portly bag came a small india rubber bath, and a leather skin filled with water. Baby was undressed, washed, powder puffed, dried, kissed, fed, put into night attire, soothed out of a squalling fit, spanked, then kissed and fed again; during which time the wretched New Yorker went into retreat behind a large copy of a Birmingham newspaper. He concludes his letter with the remark, "I am a single man, I am a nervous man, I am a bashful man, and every sense in me, nay, every fiber of me, has been mortified and outraged by a spectacle that I regard as a disgrace to the British railroad system and to civilization


