Returning from his daughter's some four miles from Buctouche, he slipped and fell, breaking his arm. Under the treatment of Dr. King the old gentleman is doing remarkably well.

—A correspondent from Kingston asks the following queries:—Has the supervisor of great roads observed the dangerous hole within one hundred yards of the south end of Kingston bridge? Has the street commissioner in Kingston observed the dangerous condition of the sidewalk from McArthur street leading westward, and extension thereof.

—Mr. John Cameron's only child, a boy of about six years, met with a serious accident at Nashwaak, on Saturday, 14th inst. He was found in the horse pasture with the lower part of his face badly smashed, the flesh being torn as far as the temple. The jaw bone is splintered. He will give no account of the cause of the wound, but it is supposed that the colt, which he had been forbidden to go near, had kicked him.

—Messrs. E. Lantalum & Co., of St. John, have received advices of the drowning of Alexander Cormier, mate of the barque Kate Cann, at Bordeaux, France. Cormier had been unwell, and on Saturday, Oct. 24, went ashore to get some medicine. He did not return to the vessel. It was feared he had fallen overboard and been drowned, and the dock was dragged. In a few days the body floated and was recovered and buried at the cemetery at Bordeaux. Cormier was a very steady and careful man, and it is supposed he lost his footing to the vessel, got stunned, and never rose to the surface of the water while living. His death was much regretted by his shipmates and employers. He has been in Messrs. Lantalum's employ for some time. Cormier belonged to Richibucto, was about 33 years old and unmarried.
