

Gleanings from Lower Miramichi.

DEAR EDITOR:— Perhaps some notes from this section might prove of interest to some of your readers, as it is frequently visited by tourists from all parts of the lower provinces.

This spot is beautifully situated on the north bank of the Miramichi, a few miles below Chatham, and is one of the calling places of the str. "Miramichi," on her daily trips down river. The scenery along the river, especially at this point, is unexcelled in the province. Here the Bartibogue, the favorite angling waters of Northumberland, enters the Miramichi, forming on the east bank a point of land—Moody's point—on which stands one of the oldest churches in the province, St. Peter's, the pastor of which is Rev. Father Morrissey whose piety and devotion to suffering humanity has won for him the love and esteem of all classes—Catholic and Protestant alike.

A short distance above the mouth of Bartibogue is Bartibogue island much admired for its beauty. Opposite this island is an imposing stone structure, erected many years ago by Major McDonald of the Glengarry Fencibles, famed in the charge at Ogdensburg, during the war of 1812, many of whose descendants still reside in this vicinity. All along here are smiling farms and fine dwelling houses that would be no discredit to many of our larger towns.

The chief industries of the place are farming and fishing, large quantities of salmon being shipped to the United States. The principal shippers are Messrs. Gordon and Innes.

The education of the children is well provided for, there being three schools situated within two miles of each other, two of which are efficiently conducted by Kent County teachers.

Now that the long evenings are approaching the young people of this locality provide for many pleasant gatherings. The latest took place at "Sugar Hill Cottage," the residence of Mr. Daniel Egan. Music was furnished by Messrs. Lynch and dancing and other amusements were indulged in; but as your correspondent has not yet received the full particulars, we cannot give the details of the evening's programme. Mr. Eaton, in whose honor it was given, was the lion of the evening. This enterprising young man has lately erected a mill here for the manufacture of spool wood. The mill will employ about fifty men, the coming season. Mr. Eaton has been in the spool business upwards of ten years and we must say it is a pity we cannot boast of a few more of such energetic men as Mr. Eaton and we hope soon to congratulate him on his winning the hand of one of our most estimable young ladies.

On the evening of the 21st inst., a pleasant gathering took place at the residence of Mr. P. McDonald, in which Kent was well represented by Misses Minnie Buckley, Lizzie Fraser and Marion Wathen.

Some of our sportsmen Messrs. McLean and Morrison, after a few days shooting down in Tabusintac have brought home one hundred geese and brant.

Having noticed in THE REVIEW of the 19th inst., an article headed "Docking Horse's Tails," we can say that this place is now behind in that fashion. A Living Skeleton.

Forty days' fasts are no longer Miracles. A hundred American towns have each produced prodigies who through sickness or slow stubborn suicide have out-Tannered Tanner, living often for many months absolutely without a morsel of food. Montreal sceptics who still sneer at these stories of human endurance may have their incredulity cured by a visit to St. Jerome. There they will find a living human skeleton furnishing the ghastly proof of a fast of five long weeks. Mrs. Matilda Gratin is the name of the woman who has gone through this dreadful ordeal of hunger unprotected, too, from the cold October winds by night as well as day.

Mr. Morand, a farmer of St. Jerome, can give the whole history of this poor woman's case. On this way to work, in a field some distance from the house, he was startled to find beneath a roadside tree, what to him seemed a dead body, emaciated almost beyond all semblance of human form. Mr. Morand raised the prostrate woman, and with the assistance of some neighbors, drove her to a friend's house in St. Jerome. There she recovered sufficiently to tell an incoherent story of her sufferings, but insanity was the sum and substance of it all. Repeated enquiries by Mr. Morand elicited the fact that the poor victim of starvation was the widow of a Mr. Gratin, a resident of the village, who had died during the past summer. Furthermore he learned that the young woman—of 25 or thereabouts, was wont to visit the spot where he found her dying. She and her husband would sit under that tree for hours in the warm evenings; and the only real theory is, that crazed by her bereavement she wandered out to the woods which were to her hallowed by so many happy memories. This hypothesis is borne out by all the circumstances known to the relatives of the poor unfortunate. The last they saw of her was when she left her home about October 10th last to go to the village church. Failing to return the next earnest search for her was instituted, but without success, and her late husband's friends concluded that she had, in her dependency perished from exposure.

Her total abstinence from food, however, is an absolute fact. A brook, some yards from the tree under which she was found supplied her with drink while she was strong enough to reach it. Otherwise for five weeks she maintained an unbroken fast, and yet she may recover health and strength. Shortly previous to her disappearance she was a servant in the house of Ald. Rolland.—Montreal Herald.
