BYE ELECTIONS IN BRITAIN. A large number of Parliament-

ary bye elections have taken place in Britain during the life of the present Imperial Legislature. Every month or so a new contest comes off at the polls. Service in Parliament seems to press hard on human life in the old land. Death or disablement seems to occur frequently in Parliamentary ranks. The loss, it is to be presumed, is mainly due to the fact that mem- it injudicious in the last degree for bers of Parliament are for the most part elderly men, not well fitted to stand the wear and tear of parliamentary work. The bye elections necessitated chiefly by death-caused vacancies in Parliament serve as public sentiment meters on measures or events of a public character. They indicate the fluctuations of public opinion, and show the trend of general feeling in political affairs. Recent bye elections in England especially have been regarded in this light. The losses suffered by the union government have been large; the gains made by the Gladstonian party have been of a size corresponding. Now and then, it is true, the Gladstonians have been beaten or at least have failed to come off victorious; but they have won numerous triumphs, not offsetted by decisive victories on the part of their opponents. It has therefore come to be a widespread conviction that in the fast approaching general election the Gladstonians will win a smashing majority. The conviction may prove ill-founded, but, at the moment, things look that way.

It is not easy to account satisfactorily for the descent of the scale on the Gladstonian side. The Salisbury government has proved a most efficient one.
