The formal dedication of the Wesley Memorial church took place Sunday morning, and a deed of the entire property was handed over to the trustees of the Moncton Methodist church by Mr. G. R. Sangster who so generously has built the edifice. Rev. G. M. Campbell preached most eloquently both the morning and evening sermons. The new organ and the new choir added materially to the service. After the sermon the formal dedication took place after which a complimentary resolution from the trustees to Mr. Sangster was read and fittingly replied to.—Transcript.

A Well-known Shipbuilder Dead.
Mr. Joseph Sullivan died at his residence High street, Portland, last night. Mr. Sullivan was a well-known master shipbuilder. When quite a young man he took charge of the late Mr. Thomas Hilliard's yard, and superintended the construction of a large number of ships. Later on he went to the North Shore and entered the employment of Mr. Geo. McLeod as foreman. There also he built a number of vessels, as well as superintended the repairs of ships. Returning to St. John, he entered Mr. F. E. Sayre's yard, and among the vessels he built while there were the barquentine Frederica and the ship John E. Sayre. Mr. Sullivan was a thorough mechanic and understood the art of shipbuilding in all its details. A few years ago he met with a very serious accident, and he has been in ill-health for some time. He leaves a widow and one son.—Globe.

Mill Burned.
About three o'clock on Monday afternoon the McLeod steam saw mill was discovered to be on fire. The alarm was quickly given, but in a very short time the mill was entirely consumed. The mill was almost new, this being only the second season for it, and was one of the best lumber mills in the province, being equipped with the most modern labor-saving machinery in use at the present time. It will be a heavy loss to the town, throwing a large number of workmen out of employment. The origin of the fire is a great mystery, as the mill had not been running for some weeks, and it was all boarded and closed up. The mill cost about \$30,000 and the direct loss will be heavy, as it was only insured for \$12,000, with life following companies: Royal Canadian, \$2,000; Atlas, \$4,000; Union Insurance, \$2,000; National of Ireland, \$4,000. At the time of writing we are unable to say whether a new mill will be erected on the site of the one destroyed.

Obituary.
By the death of Thomas G. Richardson, which occurred at his house on Monday, the sixteenth inst., Richibucto has lost one of its oldest, best known and most worthy citizens. Mr. Richardson was born at Annan, Scotland, in the year 1805, and came to this country in 1839, settling at Richibucto where he has since resided. He married Miss McLeod, of Tabusintac, Northumberland County. She lived but a short time after his marriage. His second wife was Miss Caroline Hutchings, of Charlotte County, who survives him. He leaves four children: Caleb Richardson, barrister, and Robert Richardson, of Richibucto, Mrs. George Jardine, Kingston, and Mrs. Theo. Desbrisay, Chatham. Mr. Richardson was the oldest Mason of Lodge St. Andrew, Richibucto, and has been an honorary member of that lodge for a number of years. He was buried yesterday with Masonic honors.
