**Opening of a New Church.**

A fine new church was opened at Chelmsford in the Presbytery of Miramichi on Sabbath the 23rd August by Rev. W. Hamilton, of Richibucto. The people of Chelmsford were accustomed to worship at Derby; but it was always inconvenient, and often impossible for them to attend there. Their esteemed pastor Rev. T. G. Johnston, of Blackville gave them occasional service in the local school house where a Sunday school has been conducted for a year or two. The people at last became fully alive to their need and decided to build themselves a place of worship. They were not long in carrying their resolution into effect. Kind friends helped them and their handsome new church is now occupied and is practically free of debt. The day of the opening was very fine and the congregation that assembled to take part in the dedicatory service far exceeded the capacity of the church. There was no confusion however. Those who could not get in gathered in reverent groups around the door and open windows and listened with attention to the able and eloquent discourse by Mr. Hamilton from Luke 23, 43. A liberal collection was taken up on the occasion. The event marks an interesting episode in the history of Presbyterianism on the S. W. Miramichi.

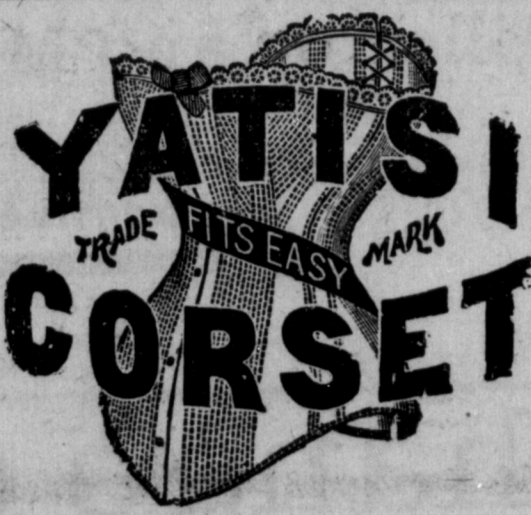

**Growth of the Finger Nails.**

The growth of the nails is more rapid in children than adults, and slowest in the aged, says the St. Louis Republic. It goes on more rapidly in summer than in winter, so that the same nail that requires 132 days to renew itself in winter would do the same work in 116 days in the summer. The increase for the nails of the right hand is more rapid than the left. It also varies in the different fingers, the variation being so as to correspond with the length of the finger. Thus, it is most rapid in the middle finger, nearly equal in the index and the ring finger, slower for the little finger, but slowest in the thumb.

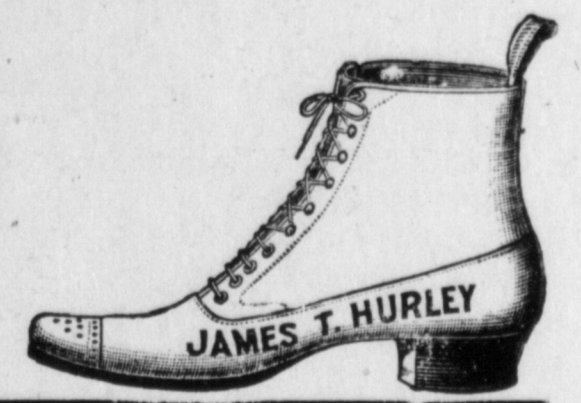

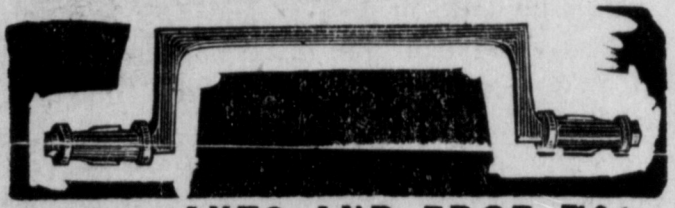
