Open Letter—To the Electors of Kent.

GENTLEMEN:—
During the past week I have had the
pleasure of meeting many of you, and ex-
plaining my views in reference to the
election which is to be held on the 15th
instant, of another member to represent
you in the House of Assembly. I hope
to have the privilege, before polling day,
of discussing the situation with many more
of you, but as it will be impossible for
me to meet you all, I desire through the
present medium to address a few plain
words to you.

This election (although only a bye-election)
is, as you have no doubt already
concluded, a very important one. That
it is so regarded by the government of the
day, is evident from the extraordinary
efforts that are being made by Mr. Blair
and the subordinate members of his gov-
ernment, as well as by his office-holders
and office-seekers in the county, to per-
suade, and, where they cannot persuade,
to frighten the electors into supporting
their candidate, Mr. Auguste Leger, of
St. Louis, a man who for years has been
bitterly opposed to them, but who they
have now, by methods of whose character
we can all judge, seduced to their sup-
port.

Not only is Mr. Blair frantically stump-
ing the county, and dictating who shall be
your representative, but papers of the dis-
reputable character of the Advance and the
Courier are being gratuitously distributed,
like snow-flakes on a winter's day, over
the county, filled to overflowing with
characteristic venom and abuse.

And yet Mr. Blair, in the face of all
these extraordinary efforts, hitherto un-
known in this county, has the cool audacity
to inform the electors that his government
is not in danger, and that he is not in need
of a supporter from Kent county to sus-
tain his tottering and rotten administra-
tion.

Gentlemen, action speaks before words,
and your shrewd common sense will give
you the answer to Mr. Blair's sophistries.
The government is making a fight for
life, and the election of a thick and thin
supporter, in the person of Mr. Leger, is
all important to it.

Who are supporting Mr. Blair's hands
in this contest? The same old party that
has been for years allied together to de-
prive the electorate of its just representa-
tion, and to place the control of the
county in the hands of a clique, the mem-
bers of which are well known to you, are
now making a determined effort to accom-
plish their purpose, backed by "the
Mercier of New Brunswick"—Andrew
G. Blair.

It is for you to say whether this bold
attempt shall succeed.

Not satisfied with the election canvasses
and tactics hitherto unsuccessfully resorted
to by them, they have sought, and are
now seeking in this contest, to stir up a
war of creeds and races, through the
medium of Mr. LaBilloy's of Richibucto,
who has had the frontiery to claim that he
is now the leader of the French Acadians in
this province.

That member of the government, in my
hearing, has warned the French people of
this county "that the enemy is at their
door! that their religion and loved mother
tongue are menaced by the opposition,
and that if they elect Mr. Gogain, they
will play into the hands of myself, and
bigots, and zealots who will seek to drive
the teaching of their language and tenets
from the schools!"

I have, in Mr. LaBilloy's presence, char-
acterized, as I now characterize him, as a
fine brand of the most despicable charac-
ter, one, who, instead of holding a seat in
the executive of the Province, should be
placed under restraint, and kept under
guard. Yet, the man who seeks in this
way to "fire the heather" in this county,
is the man who is commissioned by Mr.
Blair and his government to rally the
French people of this county to the sup-
port of Mr. Leger.

To you who know me, I can safely ap-
peal for a verdict as to my liberality and
fairness in the treatment of national and
religious questions in the county, and,
without further remark, I leave the an-
swer in your hands.

Mr. Blair and my political opponents in
the county, have announced that "this is
Phinney's fight," and that, if they can de-
feat Gogain the next man they will defeat
will be myself. That being so, I am pre-
pared to accept the challenge, and regard
it as my fight, not because I claim any pro-
minence or leadership in the county, but
because, for the time being, thanks to your
votes, I represent a principle and a party
which have hitherto led us to victory in
several hard fought contests; and I ask
you to again stand true to each other and
the party which has so loyally sustained
me in the past. If it is, as my enemies
assert, my fight, I am prepared to treat it
as such, and if, upon a full knowledge of
the situation, and after deliberate judg-
ment, you decide to place the representa-
tion of the county in the hands of a polit-
ical turncoat like Mr. Auguste Leger, and
the party by whom he is supported, I will
bow to your decision and accept the
verdict.

Since I have had the honor of repre-
senting my native county, I have never in
any instance sought my personal advan-
tage or political preferment. Had I done
so, I would now be a tame follower of the
one man Blair administration, which has,
in my judgment, done more to disgrace

the province than any government that
has preceded it.

The issue, as I have stated it, is not of
my seeking, but is forced upon me by the
declarations and canvasses of my opponents
and as such I am compelled to accept it.

Gentlemen, the result is in your hands,
and I ask you, having regard to the best
interests of the county, and the amity and
good feeling which has for some years past
prevailed amongst us, to give my friend
J. B. Gogain your hearty support.

To his honorable and manly candidature
in 1890, and the unbought support of his
friends at that election, I owe the fact
that I am now your representative, and I
urge you, my friends and supporters,
whose interests I have always regarded
much more than my own, to generously
return the favor, and send him to the
head of the poll on the 15th instant, with
a majority that will give no uncertain re-
buff to Mr. Blair's bold attempt to domi-
nate this county.

Mr. Gogain is a young man of educa-
tion, intelligence and a fair share of ex-
perience in public matters in the county,
and in this respect compares more than
favorably with his opponent. He is in a
position, whatever may be the fate of the
present government, to judge any admin-
istration on its merits, and I am convinced,
will worthily and creditably represent you,
and the different interests of the county,
in the halls of the legislature. I solicit
for him your undivided support, and feel
assured that in electing him as your re-
presentative, you will have no occasion to
regret your choice.
