Cocagne Items.

A very sad and perhaps fatal accident occurred at Notre Dame during Friday's heavy gale, by which Mr. James Killion, an old and highly respected citizen of that vicinity was so seriously injured while in the act of taking a number of farming implements from his barn which was burned to the ground, that his friends entertain little or no hope of his recovery.

The wind blew a perfect hurricane from the South-west all day and the barn, situated to the leeward of Mr. Smith's saw mill, the fire is supposed to have originated by a flying cinder blown from the sawdust pile, which was then, owing to the heavy wind that prevailed, in a solid mass of flames. The large and willing crowd that were soon on hand, could do little, however, toward the safety of the barn, and consequently turned its attention towards the house and buildings which were not destroyed. During the excitement of the moment, the old man passed unnoticed into the barn for the purpose, it is said, of getting out a driving carriage, and probably would have never returned alive, had it not been for the coolness and presence of mind shown by the parish Priest, Rev. Fr. Ouellet, who rushed into the burning building, and rescued the unfortunate man from a terrible death.

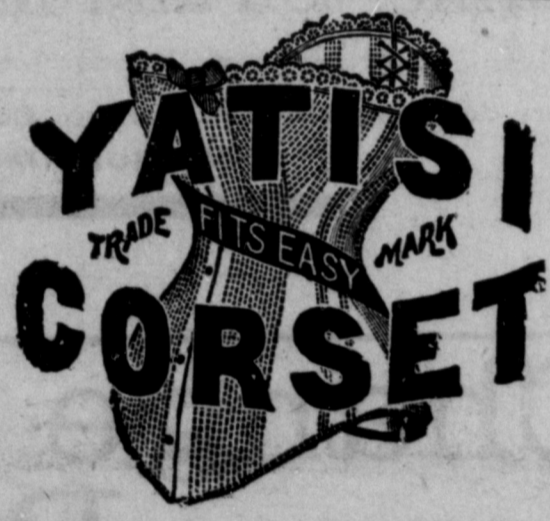

—The Bay View Hotel, Bay du Vin has been well patronized during this season, all available rooms being occupied. Mr. Malcolm Taylor, the energetic proprietor, is to be congratulated upon the success of his undertaking. He intends to enlarge his premises and make further improvements for next season.

—Says the Parrsboro Leader: A man named Webb, belonging to Cocagne, N. B., was badly hurt last Friday while working in Mayor Jones' lumberwoods at Moose River. He was standing on a lodged tree about six feet from the ground and in trying to cut a small limb, lost his balance and fell backward, striking on his head and shoulders and receiving severe contusions. He was brought to Parrsboro for medical treatment, and is rapidly recovering.

—The match race on the Kent driving park on Thursday last, between Billy Wallace and Nonpareil, was won by the former. Nonpareil was driven by A. L. Slipp, of Truro, and Billy Wallace by James Girvan, of Galloway. In the two first heats Nonpareil came under the wire first but was set back for running, his driver thereupon withdrew him and the race was awarded to Billy Wallace, who trotted the third heat alone. A large crowd of spectators was present.

—The N. Y. Herald says the United States squadron now in China waters consists of two vessels—the Alliance and the Palos. The Monocacy is at Yokohama, Japan, but as she is an old sidewheel steamer, armed with two 60-pounder breech-loading rifles and four old fashioned 9-inch guns, she would have no value as a modern war ship, even if she were in a China port, and, being so rotten as to be unseaworthy, it is unlikely she could reach Shanghai or Hong Kong without serious risk of going to the bottom.

—The inquest on the body of the man Lindon who was killed on the railway track near Sussex on Friday night was finished Saturday evening. The jury returned the following verdict: "That the said Wellington Lindon came to his death by being run over by a train on the Intercolonial Railway on the night of the 21st. inst., while under the influence of liquor. We exonerate the officials of the road from all blame in the matter, but condemn in the strongest terms the illegal sale of intoxicating liquor in the town of Sussex, by which we believe the deceased indirectly came to his end."

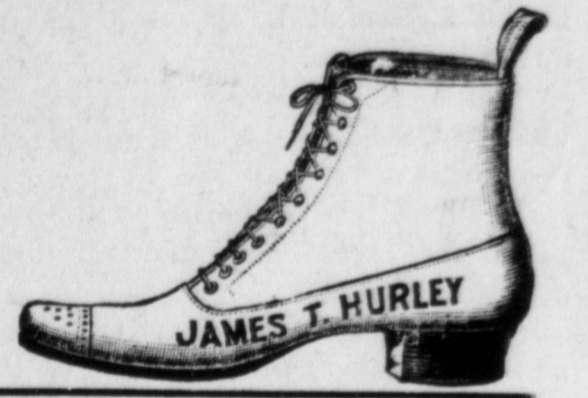

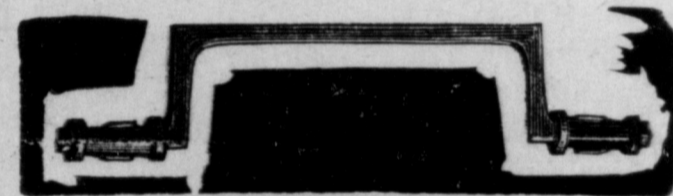
