On the Scaffold.
LIVERPOOL, Aug. 20.—John Conway,
the steamship fireman who was convicted
and sentenced to death for the murder of
the boy, Nicholas Martin, whose body was
found on May 1st, floating in a sailor's
bag in the dock, was hanged this morning.
As Berry, the hangman, was drawing the
black cap over Conway's head, the prisoner
shouted, "Hold on, I want to say some-
thing." Berry replied, "You can't speak
now," and was about to proceed with the
execution when the priest in attendance
hastily interposed, pushed the hangman
on one side and held Conway's hand while
the condemned man in broken tones asked
forgiveness for his sin. Only when the
unfortunate wretch had done speaking and
when the priest had replied to his plea for
forgiveness did the latter permit the hang-
man to proceed. This incident caused in-
tense excitement among those present, but
it was nothing compared to the horrible
scene which followed. In due course of
time the drop fell and Conway disappear-
ed from view. Immediately afterward
the priest began to read the confession of
the hanging man, in which Conway said
he was intoxicated when he did the deed
and that his reason for taking the boy's
life was that he had a morbid curiosity to
observe the process of dying. While the
priest was reading Conway's confession a
sound was heard from the scaffold as if a
quantity of water was falling. An investi-
gation was made by the hangman and the
priest officers, and to their horror they
found the sound was caused by blood
pouring upon the prison floor from Con-
way's neck. The fall had been so severe
that the criminal's head had been practi-
cally torn from his body; in fact the head
was only held to the body by the muscles
of the neck. The hangman was blamed
for his bungling.

Supposed Murder near Campbellton.
The body of an unknown man was
found on August 19, at Point Legard,
about 12 miles below Campbellton, on the
Quebec side. The only articles found on
him were a baggage check, and a ticket
from Chicago to Point du Chene. The
baggage was traced by the railway authori-

ties and found to have passed through
Moncton for Point du Chene on August
8th, where it was found. The trunk con-
tained an assortment of gentleman's wear-
ing apparel of first-class quality. It also
contained two large cabinet sized photos,
a \$5 counterfeit American bill and a let-
ter addressed to James Shaw, La Grange,
Cook Co., Illinois, from his sister, M. A.
Shaw, dated Manitou Springs, Colorado.
From the nature of the letter it was evi-
dent that Shaw was on his way to P. E.
Island to see his mother, at the request of
his sister. It is supposed that Shaw was
on the Quebec express on the night of the
7th, which passes through Campbellton
about midnight, though nothing positive
is known of him nor of the mystery which
surrounds his death.
The fact that no money or other valu-
ables were found on his person leads to
the suspicion that the stranger might have
been foully dealt with, and also recalls the
fact of the mysterious disappearance of a
stranger found on the Sugar Leaf moun-
tain at Campbellton, a few years ago.

LATER.
A watch and chain, \$149 and some minor
articles were found on the body of the
unknown man found dead at Point Le-
gard on the 19th and supposed to be
James Shaw of Cook County, Illinois.
No marks of violence were visible. This
would seem to indicate that the stranger
came to his death by other than foul
means.
