Weldford Notes.

August 25, 1891.—A political meeting in the interest of Mr. Leger, the so-called government candidate, was held in Union hall here last evening. The chair was on motion of W. W. Pride taken by B. S. Bailey, Esq., stipendiary magistrate and issuer of marriage licenses. Mr. Bailey read in a somewhat dispirited and heartbroken tone, a very lengthy and very fulsome address to Attorney-General Blair, who, with Mr. Tweedie, Mr. Sayre and several ladies occupied seats on the platform. There were also present in the audience Mr. Phinney, M. P. P., Mr. J. B. Gogain and Messrs. Robinson, Peters and Ryan-the latter being it is understood, delegates from the "purity brigade" of Moncton who accompanied the Attorney General. Mr. Risteen, the Supreme Court shorthand reporter also occupied a seat at a desk and took a full report of Mr. Flair covered very much the same ground as he did at Richibucto as reported in the last issue of THE REVIEW, except that he made a more labored effort to justify the Northumberland deal and in that connection the O'Brien-Robinson northwest bridge \$10,000 bonus. He denied most emphatically that this was a part of the "deal," but his very positive assertion did not evidently carry conviction to the minds of the audience. This was absolutely untrue. No such challenge had been given, and Mr. Blair had not given him any intimation that he wished any discussion at this meeting. He would discussion at this meeting. 
