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

When we got near I lighted the fuse, and was just in the act of throwing the cartridge when there was a fearful explosion. I fell back in the boat senseless. The cartridge had exploded in my hand. It was necessary to amputate the arm just below the elbow. My face, body and legs too, were terribly bruised and battered. My leg is not yet healed. My brother-in-law was in the boat with me. Three of my fingers struck him in the face and stunned him. No one else in the boat was hurt. The mishap laid

me up for weeks." Capt. Dodge told the story of the storming of Pasagua by the Congressionalists. Capt. Dodge is the first eye-witness to reach this port.

"The war vessels of the Congressionalists," said 'Capt. Dodge, "formed in battle array just outside the harbor. They took a position so as not to injure the foreign shipping in the harbor. The first gun fired did great damage. The cannoneer was once a resident of Pisagua. He knew the location of Balmaceda's magazine. Directly after the first cannon was discharged there was the most terrific explosion I ever heard. It sounded like tea, and, on going upstairs to his room, the discharge of a thousand cannons. rushed on deck. The air was filled with flying debris. Hatches had been torn off from the ships, masts were shattered, and skylights were smashed. All was confusion in Pisagua. The first cannon had hit the mark. It struck the powder magazine, which was filled with tons and tons of dynanite. The explosion killed hundreds of people. Houses were wrecked for miles around. The attacking fleet, after shelling the town for a few hours sailed away. The next morning the fleet reappeared, and began to shell the town again. Balmaceda's forces returned the fire. Shells whistled through our rigging. One of the shells struck a British bark which was anchored a short distance away from us. It made a complete wreck of her. Her crew had taken refuge in another vessel. After the bombardment some of my men got ashore and succeeded in getting some provisions. They also picked up several blood stained guns and swords which were strewn about the town. I succeeded in getting my cargo on board and started for this port. While Balmaceda reigns peace in Chili is out of the question. The people universally hate the man. The congressionalists have the sympathy of the peaceful and law-abiding citizens. Balmaceda is a brutal tyrant. kind He is an unfeeling man, incapable of being the ruler of a nation. The opinion in Chili is that some outside power should come to the rescue of the Chilians and rid them of Balmaceda. A more brutal, tyr-

tions are said to be reliable:-A red sky at night, whether clear or cloudy, indicates clear weather.

A sickly, greenish sky, means rain or

Coppery and tawny clouds are signs of approaching wind. A dark red sky in the morning means

rain or wind. A gray sky in the morning is a promise

of fine weather. Dark, gloomy, blue skies foretell A light blue sky indicates fair weather.

Jagged, torn clouds announce the event of high winds. A "high dawn "-when the sun is first seen above a blanket of clouds—forbodes

A "low dawn "-when the sun appears near the horizon-is a sign of fair weather. In a general way the shorter the clouds appear the milder will be the wind. Any change in colors means a change of some
