THE ONTARIO PREMIER AND ANNEXATION.

Premier Mowat of Ontario has been putting a spoke in the wheel of the busy little squad of annexationists, whirling round in Western Ontario. On the eve of the annexationist gathering in Woodstock, in that Province, he invoked action on the part of a Dr. McKay in association with other loyal people in that section, to secure the passage of a resolution at the meeting denouncing the annexation movement.

MR. CHAPLEAU ON THE FULL RECIPROCIITY SCHEME.

Mr. Chapleau, Dominion Secretary of State, acquitted himself handsomely at Providence, Rhode Island, in a reciprocity discussion, last week. He pointed out boldly the objections which Canada has and must have to that scheme. He seems to have handled the question without gloves, not at any point beating about the bush.

NEWFOUNDLAND BAIT ACT ULTRA VIRES.

Canadians generally will be glad to learn that there is good reason for regarding the Newfoundland Bait Act as unconstitutional, the British Law Officers of the Crown having advised to that effect. The delivery of this opinion, however, has no quashing power. An adverse decision of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council alone can quash, though, it seems, a special Act of the Imperial Parliament passed for the purpose could over ride.

THE BEET ROOT SUGAR INDUSTRY.

The development of the beet root sugar industry in Europe has had a great effect on the condition of the sugar islands of the world. The effect is likely to be deepened ere long. The beet root article is likely to be produced on this continent on a large scale. The soil and climate over large regions in North America are favorable to the production.

BALFOUR AND HOME RULE.

Balfour, the Balfour of the day, keeps up his interest on the chief Irish question, though he is no longer directly connected with Irish concerns. He delivered a speech in Glasgow recently in which he referred to Home Rule, and he expressed his belief strongly that Ireland would never obtain Home Rule.

THE ELECTION COURTS.

The election courts keep "pegging away," and the vacant seats in the Dominion Parliament are steadily accumulating. There are now thirteen seats vacant, possibly more. From three of these Government supporters were swept by the judicial broom, and from eight of them oppositionists were cast out.

Mr. Laurier has not won increased respect by his Boston oration. It is largely felt that his whole movement in the matter was a sad blunder. His position was a false one, his plea pitiful, his admissions unpatriotic.

A Blasphemous Sect.

When the public read in the Sunday World the graphic account of a meeting held in Yorkville last Thursday night by that mysterious religious sect, the Flying Roll, they were astounded. In the name of sense, what class of our generally sensible people can cluster about this man styling himself Michael the Prince and announcing himself really to be the Lord God Almighty come to earth? Yet in Toronto this long-haired lunatic is gathering about him a crowd of people who support his blasphemous pretensions.

We have read how at distant points some man has gone crazy with religious excitement and professed to have a divine command to sacrifice his children by fire so that an angry God may be appeased. But such men have been promptly apprehended as lunatics and the remoteness of their location made us indifferent to them. But here is something more difficult to understand. The pretensions of this so-called Michael are being honored by certain people in this matter-of-fact city. His devotees may cross us daily on the streets and may in their lucid intervals deliver vegetables at our kitchen doors. It is astonishing.

The most frenzied convert of the blasphemous Michael must admit the millennium as ushered by the Prince is a disappointment. Under the popular conception of the millennium there should be no municipal elections, no saloons, gleaming out fluid ruin, no diphtheria to rob happy homes of their sweetness and light. The veriest enthusiast should be disillusionized by one look at the unchanged, unregenerate life of this city—by the dirty, sloppy, matter-of-fact mud and drizzling dreariness of yesterday.—Toronto World.

Little River Items.

Nov. 29th, 1891.—As I have not seen any notes from Little River in THE REVIEW of late, I thought it would not be out of place to send a few items. "The summer is past and the harvest ended," and the farmers are rejoicing over the abundant harvest that they have stored.

The potato crop, with the exception of a little rot, was good. Some of the farmers, who were dilatory in digging early in the season, had quite a quantity frozen in the ground by the early frost. There are no potato buyers here yet, but there are prospects of a good market later on, quite large lots have been shipped to Moncton. The wheat crop was excellent, the most extensive wheat raisers are Messrs McDonald, Anderson, Biggs, Ward, and A. Kay, Esq., the latter raised 125 bushels. The oat crop was also good, many of the farmers raised from 200 to 300 bushels.

James McKee & Co. have begun lumbering operations. They have built a new camp and hovel, to replace the one that was destroyed by the fire that raged on their lumber privilege last summer, and expect to do a rushing business this winter.

Mr. Alman Campbell, who has been residing in Boston for the last few years, took an extensive trip out West last summer for the benefit of his health. He visited several of the principal places along the route. He states that the climate in some parts of the West is grand, but that the times are very dull—hundreds of men out of employment. His many friends in Little River were delighted to see him.

Mr. Ralph McFarlane has erected a fine dwelling house. It is being fitted up in first-class style.

Mr. Chas. O. Weldon has just completed a neat and commodious wood house, which makes his already well appointed dwelling in use complete in every respect.

Mr. Abram Gesner's trotting mare, "Lady Taylor," is looking fine, he may put her in training this winter.

Mr. Edward McDonald and Miss Janie Campbell, both of Little River, were united in the holy bands of matrimony on the 9th inst. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Neil McLaughlin. A large number of invited guests were present to witness the ceremony.

Pointed Talk to an American Audience.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 29.—Right Hon. J. A. Chapleau, secretary of state for Canada, spoke on the subject, "Canada as it is," presenting the side against annexation; at the commercial club Sturday evening. He said that the proposition to permit the United States government to regulate Canadian commerce and settle the Canadian tariff should secure even a measure of support ought to suggest much searching of conscience to our present rulers. The power proposed to be handed over so frankly to Washington was won after a long and hard struggle with the mother land. It was the one above all others of which we were most jealous. Yet at the last election an important minority voted apparently to yield it up to the United States. To permit congress to close our ports against Great Britain by means of the McKinley tariff or any such Chinese legislation as it may adopt, if not a declaration of independence and a declaration of abject dependence which would stagger the self respect of the smallest Central American republic, was a policy which would rapidly diminish imports from England and France, and utterly destroy our manufactures. Then after 10 or 12 years we should be told we ought not to accept the advantages of free trade with the United States unless we were prepared to share all the burdens of citizens. With our manufactures ruined and self respect gone, we would be compelled to sneak by a backway into the American union, instead of entering it like freemen by freemen's votes. The McKinley tariff is a measure for the passing of which we ought not to feel angry with the United States. It has done us good, and caused us to realize that we can stand upon our own feet, where before we leaned a little for support upon the United States. Speaking generally, the McKinley tariff has not been felt to be injurious in its results. The best proof of this is the circulation test of bank notes. The speaker gave many figures to show Canada's trade advancement in 1890. He concluded: "We are enjoying a measure of political liberty equivalent to independence. If anyone in this meeting believes that in refusing commercial intercourse to Canada, they would undermine the loyal feelings of our people, he is laboring under a delusion, and doing injustice to a people whose sentiments of loyalty are as indelible as your own."
