**Humphrey's Mills, Moncton.**

The carding, grist, and saw mills of J. A. Humphrey & Son, of Moncton, are worthy of special mention. The grist mill is capable of grinding fifty bushels in one hour, and ground 3,000 bushels in one week this fall. The grain was brought in by farmers in the vicinity. The saw mill near by gives employment to a large number of men, and turns out every description of dimension lumber. The carding mill ten years ago employed about six hands, now, for 6 months of the year, it requires to run this mill alone 57 hands, and in the three mills they employ from 80 to 100 hands. They take wool in exchange for cloth. Large quantities of wool is sent them from all parts of the Maritime Provinces and Quebec. Their cloths are handled by the principal wholesale and retail dealers in the Dominion. During the past spring they added fifty per cent to their former capacity. Their mills are about two miles from the I. C. R. railway station at Moncton, but there is a siding of the I. C. R. and Buctouche & Moncton Railway within a few yards of their carding mill. From the time the wool enters the mill until it is ready to come out in cloths, it passes through twenty processes, and it is a profitable hour spent to watch the manufacture of cloth.

—Inspector O'Brien and Miss Jessie Hanna were the first in town to take advantage of the sleighing on Saturday.

—The 2nd Quarterly meeting will be held at the Methodist Parsonage, Richibucto next Monday afternoon, 7th inst., commencing at 2.30 o'clock.

—The Moncton sugar refinery is having an electric light plant of its own put in for the sole purpose of lighting its buildings. The dynamo obtained is a 100 light machine.

—Referring to the report that an immediate dissolution of the legislature may be expected Premier Mercier says that another session must be held before a dissolution can take place.

—The St. John Daily Sun has been enlarged to an eight page six column quarto and is now the same size as THE REVIEW. The Sun is the largest daily in the Maritime Provinces.

—Saturday last about three inches of snow fell, which has made very good sleighing about town. This is the first time the ground has been covered with the beautiful this season.

—The fishermen are clubbed to place the duty of 3 cents on the shipper this year. The price of smelts, first catch, will be 2c. per pound; after January, 2 1/2 to 3c. This is what is proposed.—World.

—Mr. J. A. Irving's new store in Buctouche is nicely stocked and reflects much credit on the enterprising proprietor. The citizens of Buctouche on the whole possess a goaheadative spirit second to none in the province.

—Mr. Alex. Walker, of South Tilley, Victoria Co., last spring sowed five pecks of wheat on an acre and a quarter of ground and threshed out 52 heaping bushels. He also threshed about 700 bushels of oats from 26 bushels sowing.

—Extensive preparations have been made for the smelt fishing season at Buctouche. W. S. Loggie has had a fine packing shed erected. The firm of J. A. Irving & Brother will operate largely, having already several thousand boxes ready for filling.

The boys succeeded in getting hold of the canoe and remained on its bottom nearly an hour till rescued, by Mr. Robt. Hutchinson, in almost a helpless condition. They however soon recovered, nothing worse for their cold bath. The sheep were drowned.

—Some exodians who have lately returned from the wild and woolly west relate horrible tales of woe. A representative of THE REVIEW had the pleasure, or rather pain, of hearing a couple of these unfortunates recently in the Bay View hotel, Buctouche, swapping experiences when in the far West. One of the "horror" spoken of was the heart-rending scene to be witnessed in N. D. & M. of farmers digging their grain crops out of eight feet or eight inches of snow, the reporter has forgotten which. It was eight, anyhow! Some of those who have returned divide their time equally between cursing the West and the papers that induced them to emigrate.

—Richard Nagle, one of Messrs. Lantulum & Co.'s men working at the wrecked bark Codan, went adrift last Tuesday while attempting to come up to town in a small boat. The craft was leaking so badly that it took all the hardy navigator's time to bail it out, which he did with one of his boots, and was therefore unable to make any headway against the strong wind prevailing at the time. Paul Legeoff went to the rescue and succeeded in bringing him ashore. Had he gone out the north channel he would have been unable to reach land until he got to Point Sapin.
