Newfoundland Will Not Sell Frozen Herring to Canadians.

HALIFAX, Nov. 24.—Public interest in the Newfoundland fishery troubles is renewed by the determination of the Newfoundland government, just officially expressed to continue the restriction placed on Canadian vessels. Many Nova Scotia vessels have hitherto visited Newfoundland in the winter to purchase cargoes of herring for sale in the Dominion or the United States. Parties interested in the business have been anxious to know whether it could be continued. As no official information could be obtained the provincial government were applied to in the hope that they could ascertain what the attitude of the Newfoundland Government was on the subject. The following correspondence explains itself and shows that the trouble continues:—

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 16.

PREMIER WHITEWAY, St. John's, Nfld.:

Can Nova Scotia vessels purchase frozen herring in Newfoundland, not for bait, but for ordinary consumption in Canada or the United States.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 19.

PREMIER FIELDING, Halifax, N. S.:

Subject under consideration. Will advise result.

Uncertainty of your regulations respecting purchase frozen herring exceedingly embarrassing to many Nova Scotians. Would respectfully ask earliest possible decision.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 24.

PREMIER FIELDING, Halifax:

The restrictions upon export of bait fishes still existing. Government regret that the action of the Canadian Government in opposition to Newfoundland's proposed convention with the United States and the persistence of the Canadian fishermen in supplying the French with bait to the injury of this colony, compel Newfoundland in self-protection to continue the restrictions on export of herrings.

Captains Reinhardt and Publicover

have prepared a statement of the grievances of Canadian fishermen against Newfoundland for which they demand the immediate consideration of the Dominion Government. They say: "Last year Newfoundland placed a heavy bait tax on our vessels. This year she refused to sell them bait on any conditions, at the same time allowing United States vessels to take it free. This completely stopped our grand bank fishery, by far the largest part of our business. Many of our best vessels could not get crews, the fishermen preferring Yankee schooners and untaxed bait. Two fishing seasons have gone by and surely our government by this time can see the effect of moral suasion on the Newfoundlanders, who has everything he wants from Canada, viz., free market for his surplus fish and free fishing port, which he uses as a basis when he cannot use his own. Only a few weeks ago a largenumber of Newfoundland vessels were using Sydney as a port from which to carry on fishing operations along the Cape Breton coast. Every fisherman knows that the large quantities of Newfoundland fish bought at Halifax and Lunenburg this season have taken thousands of dollars from the fishermen's pockets. One merchant, a strong opponent of the present government, we are informed, has purchased upwards of 40,000 quintals of these fish. A majority of the fish merchants are opposed to the Government, and many of them use the free importation of these fish as a strong canvass with the fishermen against the Government.

"Now, it is not alone on the Grand Bank fishery that the Newfoundlanders do as they like. On the Labrador shore they have certain fishing rights from Blanc Sablon to Gross Water Bay. The past fishing season, which was a good one on that coast, they took the bulk of their fish in Canadian waters, either on the West coast or north of Gross Water. Our Labrador men on arrival there last June, found a large number of Newfoundland vessels occupying all the best fishing berths west of Blanc Sablon. One fleet of Newfoundland vessels met in Canadian water by our fishermen numbered seventy-six sail. They were on a good spurt of fish at this place but on account of them our vessels had to leave and go further north. We are also informed that a Newfoundland named Whitley, a resident of St. John's, and a member of the Newfoundland Government, owns or controls all the fishing stands for traps and seines at Bonne Esperance, one of the best fishing harbors on the Canadian Labrador coast. He also fits out a large number of fishing stands with supplies which his vessels bring from Newfoundland, and on which he pays no duties. He owns eighty large fishing boats and employs 160 Newfoundlanders fishing in Canadian waters.

"His son is Collector of Customs for Newfoundland at Blanc Sablon and collected duties for our fishing vessels on the salt and barrels they had on board. One of our vessels, the Cymbeline, Captain Ritey, paid duty on salt, etc., no part of which was used in their waters or landed there. The same salt, etc., will be taken to that coast again next year and will have to pay the same amount of duty over again. Newfoundland takes the larger part of the catch on the Labrador coast and the past season three-fourths of her Labrador fish were taken in Canadian waters. Thus a large portion of the fish forced on our market this season by Newfoundland was caught in our own waters.

"Now what we ask of our Government is that they treat Newfoundland as she has treated us. Canada has the weather-gauge in this business and must take advantage of it. Stop Newfoundland fish from entering our markets and prohibit them from fishing in our waters. Nothing short of this will bring the Newfoundlanders to their senses."

On Youngclaus's premises the officers found a lot of horse flesh in pickle, verifying the report that Youngclaus was shortly to sell on contract a quantity of "corned beef." Youngclaus is said to have a partner who has, however, fled, taking with him a lot of old horses which were to be slaughtered.

A warning to persons drinking cold water, to be sure that it is as pure as possible is given by the recent case which occurred here, when a young lady of our town, on being given emetic by the doctor, vomited up a snake or some such creature about twelve inches long. The lady in question had been ailing for some time and no cause could be assigned for that illness. Strange to say the more the story goes round, the longer the snake grows.—Amherst Press.
