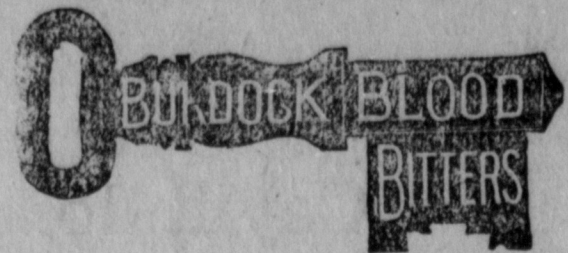

### Self-Acting Paper-Cutter.

A Calcutta newspaper relates an incident which illustrates the magnificent way in which the Rajahs of India—or at least those of them who remain opulent and powerful—repay a small debt. Not long ago the Rajah Holkar of Indore, in paying a visit to the Viceroy, the Marquis of Lansdowne, at Calcutta, was shown by the Marquis several of the London illustrated newspapers. In cutting the leaves of these journals, Lord Lansdowne used an ivory paper-cutter.

The Rajah had never seen a paper-cutter before, and was much interested in the little instrument.

"If your excellency will make me a present of it," he said, "I will send you another in exchange."

The Viceroy promptly gave his guest the paper-cutter, and the Rajah returned with it to his own dominions.

Lord Lansdowne had almost forgotten the incident when he received notice that the Rajah's return gift was on the way; and he was presently astonished to have brought to him a young and handsome elephant, each of whose tusks had been skillfully wrought into the shape of a paper-cutter.

A servant brought some illustrated newspapers, at which the elephant seized them with his trunk, and proceeded very skillfully to cut the leaves with his sharply trimmed tusks. He had been trained to this accomplishment under the Rajah's orders.

The living paper-cutter, it is understood, is still in Lord Lansdowne's possession; but it is not one of the ordinary furnishings of the Viceroy's library. For his customary opening of books and newspapers, he keeps a less bulky implement.

Over one hundred thousand dollar's worth of pearls was found in mussels on the Sugar river, Wisconsin, last summer.

Baron Hirsch is said to be worth \$100,000,000, which he made chiefly out of his contracts for building Turkish railroads.

The eleventh annual convention of the American Federation of Labor will be held at Birmingham, Ala., December 14, 1891.

Bread in a good state of preservation has been unearthed in Pompeii recently in the new rooms uncovered by the explorers.

T. P. O'Connor was asked on a Friday to write a short biography of Parnell, and he handed in his work of 15,000 words on Saturday.

Servant girls in California receive on an average \$25 per month. Nurse girls are paid from \$15 to \$20, and good cooks from \$30 upwards.

Governor Bulkeley, of Connecticut, has expended from his private resources between \$150,000 and \$200,000 in paying bills for the state.

A spoon for measuring medicine, by which a dose can be administered without spilling, has been invented by Mrs. Horace Goodwin, of Boston.

The House of Representatives of New Zealand has passed a bill granting residential suffrage to women and qualifying them for election to parliament.

Phosphorous is now being made by electricity. The principal manufacture is in England, where it is anticipated fully 1,000 tons will be made annually.

A farm in Pithole, Pa., which was bought some years ago during the oil excitement by Chicago speculators for \$1,000,000, was sold recently at a tax sale for \$100.

The town of Larné has been illuminated with electric light for the first time. This is the first town in the North of Ireland which has adopted electricity for illumination.

A Holland Journal, *De Klok*, publishes an advertisement of a gunmaker, calling attention to a new kind of shotgun, very cheap, and "specially recommended to poachers."

There is a railroad in Kansas so dilapidated that but one train a day can be run over it at the rate of eleven miles an hour. This is the Kansas Central, a branch of the Union Pacific.

One of the most eminent sculptors in Italy, Vela, has just died at the age of 70. His parents were peasants, and he was a quarry boy in Viggiro, like his elder brother. Both became sculptors.

By a French law Boulanger's will is void, and every effort is being made to induce Mme. Boulanger to assert her rights. As the general's widow she is entitled to an annual life pension of \$700.

James Stephens, the famous Fenian head centre, though 70 years old, retains all the fire of youth. Although an indictment for high treason still hangs over his head, he is permitted to reside in Dublin.

The colony of Sierra Leone is 103 years old, yet there is no machinery there except the sewing machine. The population is upwards of 50,000, and not a saw mill or any other kind of a mill in operation.

The Siberian exile petition to be sent to the czar from Philadelphia will weigh several hundred pounds, contains 500,000 names and if the sheets were pasted together would stretch out two and three-quarter miles.

The crown prince of Japan, who is at present a pupil in the school of Nobles in Tokio, is said to be a bright and industrious boy. He has just finished the fourth year in the elementary department. It is said that he did not miss one day at school during the past year.

Miss Betham Edwards, the English novelist, is credited with strong and unusual opinions upon several subjects. She does not eat meat, is an advocate of cremation, thinks "The Scarlet Letter" the finest novel of the century and dislikes Ibsen and Tolstoi. She is a cousin of Miss Amelia B. Edwards, the Egyptologist.

The ameer of Afghanistan has issued a proclamation announcing that he intends to visit England. He has heard of the jolly time his great friend, the shah of Persia, had while visiting the queen and British nobility. The news is quite a surprise to England, as the ameer has not been invited to come. A ruler of that country has never been so far away from home, though two or three of them have been entertained in lavish oriental style in India.

### The Potato Beetle's Friend

There is a curious association between certain plants and certain animals which looks almost like a mutual affection. The catnip, which comes from Europe with the cats, seems never to grow where there are no cats to nibble it. The "Luffalo grass" is disappearing with the buffalo, and along with the settlers who are occupying the plains, where the buffalo used to rove, come many new plants, some of them entirely uninvited. The burdock, for instance, clings tenaciously to human kind, and seems unwilling to grow unless there are "folks" somewhere in sight. And there no one can exterminate it.

One of the most remarkable instances of the apparent migration of a plant, as if to keep company with an insect, is the removal of the homely plant which botanists call *solanum rostratum*, from the vicinity of the Rocky Mountains eastward.

About the year 1867 the farmers of the Mississippi Valley began to be aware of a new pest in their fields, whose ravages were becoming alarming. A stocky, gaudily striped beetle, which multiplied at an alarming rate, and began to devour their potato vines. Nothing could stay or exterminate the plague. The potatoes deprived of their vines rotted in the ground, and an important crop was lost.

This beetle naturally received from the farmers the name of "potato bug." It was found to have begun an eastward march from the uncultivated strip of Eastern Colorado and Eastern Kansas, and it has consequently since been known as the Colorado potato beetle.

It was also found that in the region of its origin this beetle had fed upon *solanum rostratum*, a plant belonging to the same genus as the potato. Doubtless the insect had been quite content with this article of food. But some settlers planted a field of potatoes, and the beetle at once fell in love with them.

Migrating eastward, in eager search for its new food, the Colorado beetle multiplied with astonishing rapidity. In a few years it had covered the whole country and had devastated potato fields clear to the Atlantic coast. Then some of the beetles, or their eggs, were carried in vessels across the ocean, and the insect began a new career of conquest in the Old World for it spread over the British Isles and the Continent of Europe.

All this because some one had planted a potato field in Colorado. But what about the *solanum rostratum*, so heartlessly abandoned by its old friend? One would suppose that, left free from the devouring attentions of the beetle, it would have been content to stay where it was; but this has not been the case. The weed seems to have set out immediately in search of the beetle.

The prevailing direction of plant migration in this country is westward. With the settlement of the country, the plants of Europe and of Eastern America tend to crowd out the native vegetation of the West. But this plant proves an exception to the rule. Apparently it believes that its destiny is to be eaten; nothing but the potato beetle will eat it, and so it comes east to find that insect. It has spread over cultivated lands in Texas and Missouri, and last summer Prof. L. H. Pammel found it growing at Watertown, Wisconsin.

Wherever it goes it is a troublesome weed, and seems to increase in size as it comes eastward.
