THE ENQUIRY ENDED.

The commission appointed by the Quebec Governor to inquire into the facts of the alleged Baie des Chaleurs steal completed its task last week. At the moment of writing, its report has not been presented, nor is it publicly known whether that report will include a finding on the facts, as well as a statement of the evidence taken. People will not be satisfied without a pronunciation of judgment on the part of the commission on the facts ascertained. Should the report, however, include a verdict, we may be sure public opinion will be divided as to its merits.

But, finding or no finding, opinions will probably concur in the conclusion that the commission has striven to elicit the exact truth, leaving no reasonable means unemployed to penetrate to the heart of the matter investigated. Clearly the commission performed its painful task intelligently, energetically and with strict impartiality, showing no animus whatever save that of an earnest desire to discover the truth. No such investigation would have been made by a partisan committee of the Quebec legislature. The outcry raised against Lieutenant Governor Angers for declaring in favor of a commision of judges in the case, was manifestly unjustifiable. Success of Co-Operative Labor. A striking proof of the steady progress of the principle of co-operative production was given Friday at Leicester, England, where over 500 delegates from all parts of the kingdom assembled to assist at the formal opening of the largest cooperative boot and shoe factory in the world. The factory stands on six acres of ground. The buildings cost £30,000, and when fitted with machinery the total outlay will have been £50,000. The working capital will be £200,000, and the factory will be able to turn out 50,000 pairs of boots every week.
