### Freak of Nature.

Mr. G. T. Allamby raised the past season the most peculiar freak in the way of a squash that has come to the notice of The News for some time. When ripe the vegetable was of a reddish brown, rather longer than thick, and when an attempt was made to cut it, the knife went through it surprisingly hard. Upon examination the squash was found to be separated by lines into four parts, and in each direction laid a substance very hard and a good deal like corn-cob. On the other side of this cob like substance were two rows of kernels which had every appearance of corn, giving four ears of corn bearing two rows each of kernels, inside of a squash. The hard substance was removed from the vegetable, which did not contain even one seed and the remainder of this peculiar product of a Bangor garden cooked and eaten, the kernels cooking up just as did rest of the squash.—Bangor News.

### Mr. Blair's \$5,000.

The report connecting the name of Hon. Mr. Blair, premier of New Brunswick, with the distribution of Pacand's boodle was fully confirmed during the closing hours of the royal commission. The proceeds of one of the \$5,000 blank notes bearing the endorsement of Mercier, Langelier and Pelletier was transmitted to the New Brunswick chieftan and the note was paid by Pacand on the first of May. Two days before this, five \$20,000 checks which represented that persons share of the Baie des Chaleurs deal had been indorsed over to him by Armstrong. The case was therefore a clear one.—Sun.

Bread in a good state of preservation has been unearthed in Pompeii recently in the new rooms uncovered by the explorers.

The experiments made at Cornell University and in France to ascertain the effect of the electric light upon vegetation have demonstrated its wonderful property of greatly stimulating almost every variety of vegetable life. The colors of flowers are intensified, and an increased yield of fruit and vegetables of nearly 100 per cent. has been obtained, without diminishing the odor of the former or the flavor of the latter. The parts of the soil are more actively dissolved by the influence of the light and are thus brought within reach of roots.

An investigation at Carthage, Ill., reveals the site of either a prehistoric battlefield or a massacre. Nearly one thousand skeletons have already been unearthed, five hundred being found in one heap. Many of the skulls contained ragged holes, indicating that either the owner met death in warfare from a bludgeon or a battle axe. The skeletons show conclusively that these people were a race of giants, with huge jaw bones, low foreheads, and evidently barbarous habits. It is a singular fact that no pottery or implements of warfare have been found to indicate how these people performed their labors or fought their battles.
