THE DYING YEAR.

THE NEW CABINET IN QUEBEC.

The events occurring in Quebec have largely absorbed public attention in Canada for some time past. The effort to form a ministry to succeed that of Count Mercier was watched by all with interest, by some with anxiety.

The new Cabinet has been completed. The names of most of its members are not familiar to our readers. But it is to be observed that the members are all men of high and well established character.

By this time some of the seats in the Dominion Parliament have been emptied of their occupants, the election courts are still at work, and a few more heads are about to fall into the judicial basket.

National Heritage.

The Rev. J. S. Ross, of Woodstock, Ont., is a noted statistician and an eloquent minister of the Methodist church. His local paper contains an outline of his sermon on the above subject, which will be of interest to our readers.

Take first the extent of our territory, Scotland would be drowned in Lake Superior, Belgium or Denmark could be easily submerged in Lake Huron, Ireland could be hid in our North-west forests.

On account of the extent of our area we have a climate varying from the latitude of Constantinople to the North Pole. St. John, N. B., is in the latitude of Venice.

Our forests produce sixty different kinds of wood, and our fisheries return seventeen millions of dollars annually, and are not one-third developed.

On this continent the only sources of coal on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts are in our Dominion, and between these two are coal deposits amounting to sixty five thousand square miles, with an estimate of from four and a half to nine millions of tons to the square mile.

In shipping Canada comes fourth, being surpassed only by Great Britain, Sweden, Norway and Germany, France comes fifth, and the United States sixth.

The first railway in Canada was built in 1836 between Laprairie and St. John's, Quebec. In 1850 there were only 71 miles of railway in all the Dominion; now there are 14,004, which places Canada eighth on the list of the world.

Our canals have cost over fifty-one millions of dollars, and by means of them we have the largest and most important system of inland navigation in the world.

The McKinlay Bill.

Dealing with this subject at Providence, Hon. Mr. Chapleau said: 'The points that troubled our farmers when the McKinlay tariff came into force were barley, lambs, horses and eggs.'

This season we have sent three and a half million dozen of eggs to England, where in 1889 we sent about 3,000 dozen.
