County Court.

The September sitting of the Supreme Court for the County of Kent opened on Tuesday, His Honor Judge Fraser presiding. Mr. F. H. Risteg, official reporter. There was no business, criminal or civil, to transact. His Honor made a brief address to the Grand Jury, congratulating them and the county on the absence of any business of a criminal nature. In the course of his remarks, he touched on the general condition of business, etc., in the county and province at large, regretting that the dullness of the lumber business during the past season had seriously retarded the prosperity of the north shore of this province. He also dwelt on the fact that there were no cases in the civil docket, which fact he regretted. He had always remarked that increased litigation followed increased prosperity. After the dismissal of the grand and petit juries, the court adjourned sine die.

A Whistle in His Throat.

John J. J., a boy of some nine years, who lives at Acadia street, North end, met with a peculiar accident on Saturday, which it seems is almost certain to result in his death. He was blowing a Punch & Judy whistle and when drawing in his breath it slipped down his throat and lodged in his windpipe. Being an inch long and a quarter of an inch in circumference the whistle caused the boy terrible suffering and while a sound at each breath he drew. He was taken to the general public hospital where he was put under the influence of ether while Drs. White, Christie and Esson made an incision in his throat just above the breast bone to search for the whistle. The boy's nose and mouth being closed his breath came through the incision and the whistle sounded, showing that it was lodged below where the incision had been made. The search was continued for about two hours but without success. It is thought that the whistle is now lodged in his left bronchial tube, and, as the boy is very weak and suffering much, it is feared that nothing can be done to save his life.—Gazette.

—The somewhat discouraging news comes from Caribou that rust has killed the potatoes and the tubers are rotting badly. In some fields one-half are affected. Other fields were killed before the tubers were grown and it is now believed that the crop in northern Aroostook will not be more than half as large as has been calculated upon. Farmers feel a little blue over the outlook. It is likely that the trouble may be a little exaggerated.
