#### Ceunty Court.

The September sitting of the Supreme Court for the County of Kent opened on Tuesday, His Honor Judge Fraser presiding. Mr. F. H. Risteen, official reporter. There was no business, criminal or civil, Household to transact. His Honor made a brief address to the Grand Jury, congratulating them and the county on the absence of any business of a criminal nature. In the course of his remarks, he touched on the general condition of business, etc., in the county and province at large, regretting that the dullness of the lumber business during the past season had seriously retarded the prosperity of the north shore of this province. He also dwelt on the fact that there were no cases in the civil docket, which fact he regretted. -Dr. W. A. Ferguson, successor to Dr. Bowser, office next door to Mrs. Marsh's, Kingston. Place of residence will be made known later.



The heifer is a very vicious animal, having struck the horse over a dozen times before being driven away.

-One of the heaviest showers experienced at Bangor for years occurred Friday. Torrents of rain fell, the streets being turned into miniature rivers. There was a very heavy wind and sharp lightening. Big hail stones fell during the shower. Large limbs were blown from the trees in many places. The guy wires on the electric railway were knocked down on State street and the road suspended running cars during the shower.


