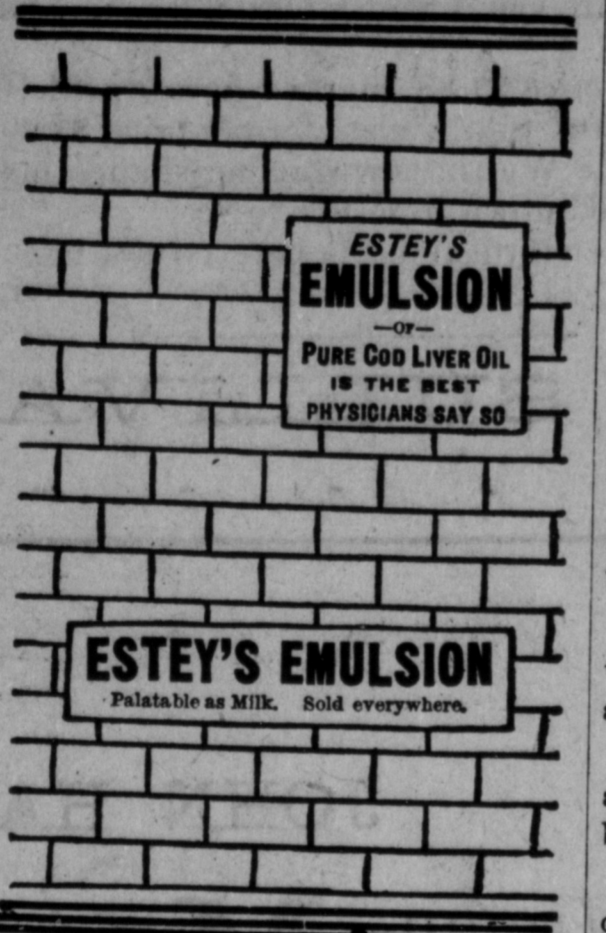

—Mr. James Cochrane died on Tuesday, aged 79 years. He was living with his brother Mr. John Cochrane.

—The late hurricane on the west coast of Ireland was the most violent experienced in that part of the country in twenty years.

—Sheriff Wheten had his leg injured while jumping from a wagon, to which was attached an unmanageable horse, the other day, at Cocagne.

—A resident of Woodstock has had a letter from Mrs. Birchall, who is indignant because some newspapers have reported that she was married again.

—The old Weldon building, which was at one time occupied as a printing office by Davis P. Howe, has been torn down. Messrs. George Fraser and Wm. Clark had the contract.

—A number of local turfmen are getting up races to take place on the Moncton driving park on Thanksgiving day. \$300 will be offered in prizes, \$100 for a 2.50 race and the same amount for the 2.40 class.

—Daniel Desmond, of Campbellton, charged with causing the death of one Leguff, by striking him with a piece of wood, was on Wednesday released on bail—himself in \$1,000 and two securities each \$1,000. His trial takes place in November.

—The members of F. troop, McDougall Settlement, the 8th P. L. N. B. Regiment of Cavalry, will assemble on the Princess Louise Range on Saturday, the 24th inst., to fire the regular semi-annual troop matches. Shooting to commence at 8 o'clock sharp.

—W. A. Cathers, representing J. M. Humphrey & Co., of St. John, N. B. arrived in town this week, and is working his way up north shore with his full line of samples. "Billy" is trying to boom business; he says it is one of the hardest falls he has ever had on the road.

—At the Marysville cotton mill there is the largest supply of cordwood ever seen in this province. It is computed at 10,000 cords, but is put by some at nearly 20,000. It is for running the mill during the winter months when the saw mill is idle and no wood can be had for them.

—William McLeod who describes himself as a constable and gives his residence in Sussex, Kings County, has petitioned to have the name of James Domville removed from the Dominion election list on the ground that he is not a property holder in Kings Co., or elsewhere in Canada.

—It is stated that Father Michaud, of Buctouche, has raised this year over 600 bushels of good clean wheat; Dominique Robichaud, over 300 bushels, and Venant Burke, merchant, 200 bushels. Mr Burke has also threshed from the seed of 12½ bushels of oats sown, 257 bushels weighing 39 lbs. to the bushel. The oats were sown on 4½ acres of ground.

—A farmer in the neighbourhood of Kingston planted three potatoes of the "Stray Beauty" variety this spring. On digging them the other day he found two hundred and seventeen good sized tubers, measuring one bushel and a quarter, and not one of them affected with rot. This potato which greatly resembles the "Early Rose," but is ripe eight days sooner, seems well adapted for this locality.

—Sir Henry Parkes, Premier of New South Wales, has resigned as a result of the defeat of government last week on the labor bill. It is again said that Sir Henry Parkes, owing to his advanced age, will retire to private life.

The award in the government and the C. P. R. arbitration over the Ouderdonk Pacific coast section was made public Saturday The C. P. R. is to receive \$759,000 to be spent under government supervision in improving this section of the road. The C. P. R.'s share of the expenses are said to amount to \$250,000.

The wife of the late William Henry Smith, leader in the House of Commons, has been elevated to the peerage.

It has been officially announced that the Right Hon. Arthur J. Balfour, member of parliament for East Manchester at present chief secretary to Ireland, has been appointed first lord of the treasury.
