

-At the Marysville cotton mill there is the largest supply of cordwood ever seen in this province. It is computed at 10,-000 cords, but is put by some at nearly. 20,000. It is for running the mill during the winter months when the saw mill is idle and no wood can be had for them.

-Willliam McLeod who describes himself as a constable and gives his residence in Sussex, Kings County, has petitioned to have the name of James Domville removed from the Dominion election list on the ground that he is not a property holder in Kings Co., or elsewhere in Canada.
