School Meeting.

The annual school meeting of District No. 1, Richibucto, was held at the Grammar School building last Thursday, the 8th inst. J. Ferguson, Esq., was elected chairman, and John Stevenson, Esq., secretary. The accounts of the trustees for last year were read and approved, and a committee consisting of Messrs. Wm. J. Smith, auditor, Wm. D. Carter, Wm. H. McLeod, Dr. Bourque and Allan Haines was appointed to consider some means of lessening the expenditure of the district for the ensuing school year. The meeting then adjourned till the afternoon to give time to the committee to report. In the afternoon the committee reported favoring a \$500 loan to meet the present outstanding indebtedness, the placing of a first class female teacher in the advanced department of the school at a reduced salary, the issuing of executions against all delinquent ratepayers, and an assessment of \$1100 on the school district for the coming year. The report was then taken up section by section by the meeting and passed. Mr. Wm. D. Carter was elected trustee in place of Mr. J. D. Phinney, whose term of office had expired. After a vote of thanks had been tendered the chairman, the meeting adjourned.

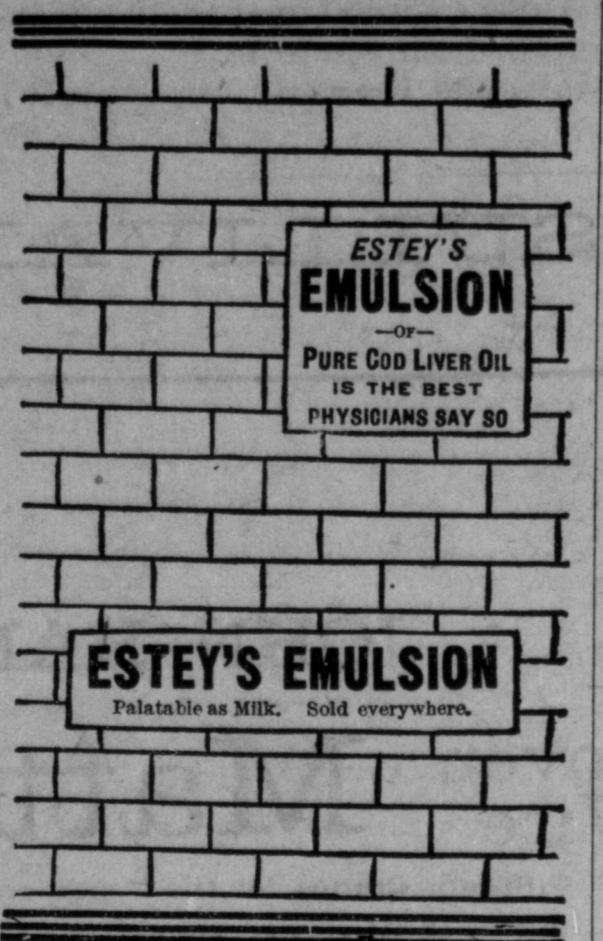
