THE WORLD OVER.
The Grand Trunk has advanced em-
ployees wages 10 per cent. on the strength
of the large traffic returns.
Moffatt's steam mill at Dalhousie, and
half a million feet of sawn lumber were
destroyed by fire last Wednesday night.
The loss is about twenty-five thousand
dollars; no insurance.

A sub-committee of the council at Ot-
tawa is still continuing the investigation
as to irregularities in the departments. It
is understood that, pending a final deci-
sion, Messrs. Pereira, Henry and Turner
have been notified to resume duty.

The situation of the striking saw mills
hands at Ottawa, is not so favorable as
before. It is alleged that some families
of strikers are face to face with actual
want, local tradesmen having refused
further credit. The relief committees of
the strikers are distributing provisions.
Enough men have been secured by Bran-
son's and Perley's to run the mills, and
shipping is going on about as before the
strike was inaugurated.

At Greenup, Ill., on Oct. 8, as a balloon
was ascending at the fair ground, Alex.
Gordon, a country youth, became entan-
gled in the ropes attached to the parachute
and was carried up, his head hanging
downward. In his struggles he caught
the cord that releases the parachute, and
